Multnomah county will have an aviating candidate in the race for the republican nominations as state representative. Ed Popick, well known young business man of Portland, adopted modern transportation when he went to Salem to file his candidacy, flying to the capital with Basil Russell, of the Bush Flying service.

Popick also carried a plea to Gov. L. L. Patterson to commute the sentences of Ellsworth Kelley and Jas. C. Willos, which he was unable to deliver, owing to the governor's absence.

Strong support is being given Popick in his campaign. Although unsuccessful in his race for the nomination two years ago, his maiden effort, Popick made such a splendid showing that his friends urged him to run again.

"Promises made a year in advance of the legislative session mean nothing," says Ed Popick, candidate for the state legislature on the republican ticket for the May primaries. So Popick is making no promises in the campaign other than his statement that he will be governed by the wishes of the people as made known to him.

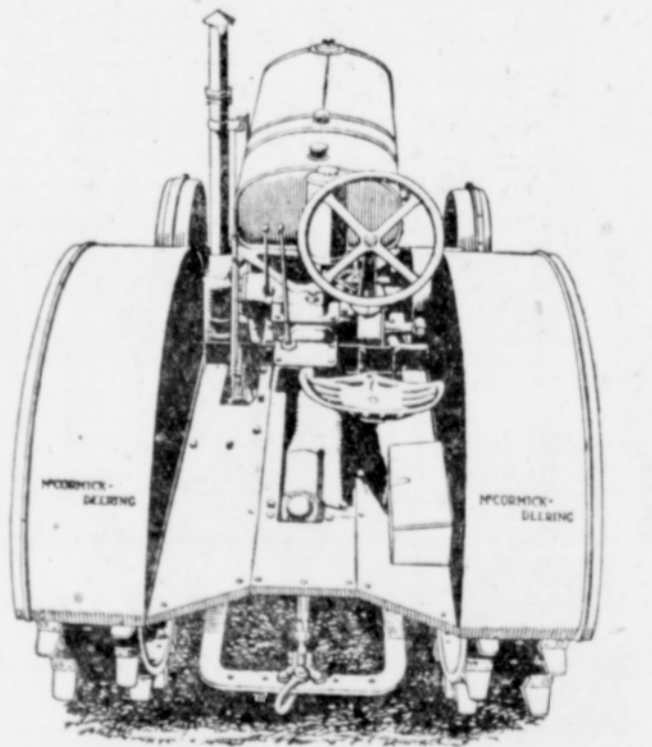
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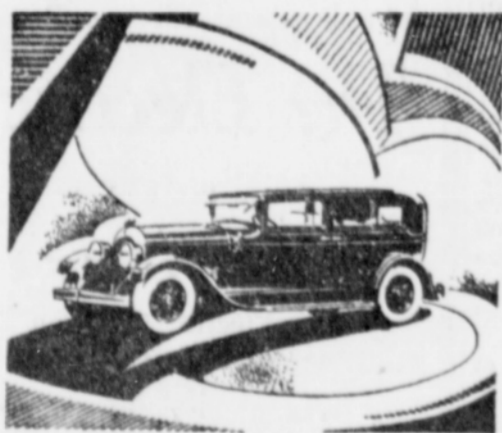
