### Fruit Organization Votes to Dissolve

The special meeting of the stock-The special meeting of the stock-holders of the Gresham Fruit etta, "In a Florist's Window," will Growers association was called Saturday and nearly 85 per cent of the stock was found to be repre-The financial statement vas read by Secretary J. J. Fisher. After the bills were allowed the cash balance was found to be sufficient to pay six per cent on the outstanding stock. This dividend was declared. The resolution asking for a dissolution of the corporation was unanimously carried.

It was unanimously decided to instruct the executive officers to transfer the cannery property to the Berry Growers Packing com-pany. Those other than members of the Berry Growers association exchanged their old stock certificates for an equal number of shares in the Berry Growers Packing com-

all owners of stock who hold assignment receipts of certificates should present them at the cannery office when par value will be paid, plus a six per cent dividend. This makes a total dividend of 21 per cent paid since the organization of association. While it seems small, it will doubtless compare favorably with many other investments that have been made, officials of the company said. It made the development of the berry industry possible and all local stockholders have been benefited thereby.



# Speed Bowl Sunday

The Veterans of Foreign Wars are sponsoring the finest auto race meet held in the northwest at the speed Bowl track, Base Line and Twelve-Mile corners, next Sunday, May 6, according to the promoters who are men of experience in the

It will be the first race of the season at the Speed Bowl tracks and all the speed demons of the northwest will compete, according to the report of the Western Auto Racing association, who say there will be at least 20 of the fastest race cars in the northwest vieing for honors.

The track is said to be in perfect shape. It has been smoothed up and oiled to make it absolutely dust proof. A large crew of men has been at work repairing the fence and grandstand.

There will be six events. The races proper will start at 2:30 p. m., preceded by the time trials starting about 1 p. m.

Then will come the consolation race for non-money winners, followed by the big free-for-all, 25 laps, which promises to be one of the most spectacular races ever witnessed on a half-mile dirt track in these parts.
