

Clackamas Schools Have Track Meet

An all-day track meet for eastern Clackamas county is being held today at Sandy Union high school, with pupils present from the districts of Boring, Cottrell, Kelso, Lusted, Sandy, Sandy Ridge, Bull Run, Welches, Cherryville, Dover, Greenwood, Firwood, Brightwood, Marmot, Ames, Deep Creek and Eagle Creek. Blue, red and white ribbons will designate the three prize-winning divisions in potato, track and field events in each of three classes, A, up to nine years of age; B, between 9 and 12; and C, all pupils above 12.

Much interest is the exhibit from the department of industrial art of Sandy Union high, in which three prizes in each class are being distributed. The classifications include cedar chests, sewing cabinets, writing desks, wardrobes and dressers.

Three prizes will also be given in the home economic department of the high school for the best cake, pies and buns. Three prizes will be given for the best displays of sewing. For the three best business letters in the commercial department prizes will be awarded.

The Sandy and Estacada high schools are crossing bats in a baseball game. Picnic lunch was enjoyed at noon.

Lecturer to Speak in Powell Valley

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
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AGED FAIRVIEW MAN IS CALLED BY DEATH
