The turn of the season has come at last. Summer is here and 1928 recalls the old riddle "Why is the year 1928 like a lumber wagon?"...

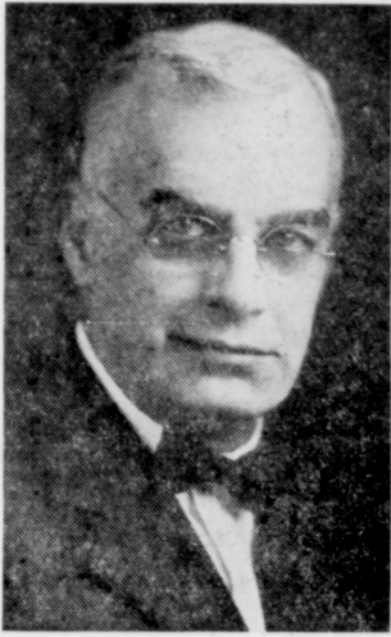
If you are growing strawberries you must act quick as the damage of even one day's delay in killing the weeds and stirring the soil means a heavy loss.

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DEATH BRINGS RELEASE TO EMANUEL ANDERSON

At the close of a long life, well rounded out with the best that life affords, death came Sunday to relieve the sufferings of Emanuel Anderson of Pleasant Home, for 22 years past a resident of Gresham and vicinity.

Emanuel Anderson was born in Borgunda parish, Sweden, July 1, 1849. He came to America in March, 1869, and in August of the same year to Bucklin, Missouri, where February 21, 1875, he was joined in wedlock to Miss Christina Onsdorff, who, with six children, survives him.

Mr. Anderson was a member of the board of directors of Emanuel hospital from its organization in 1910 until two years ago, when he was compelled to resign on account of failing health.

Besides his widow, the deceased is survived by six children, Julius E. of Vancouver, Wash., Mrs. Ellen Sandstedt of Chicago, Edward G. Price of Aloha, Oregon, and Mrs. Emelie M. G. Lundbom of Gresham.

Funeral services in English and Swedish were held this afternoon in the Saron Lutheran church, with interment in Lincoln Memorial Park under the direction of the Gates Funeral home.

The pallbearers were Frank Staffenson, S. M. Staffanson, August Staffenson, Andrew Rydberg, A. W. Anderson and C. A. Lindgren.
