In the passing of Edgar B. Piper the newspaper fraternity of Oregon and the northwest feels a great loss.

As editor of the greatest newspaper of the northwest, and recognized as among the best in the country, Mr. Piper had a place of high standing in the minds of the leaders of the nation.

As editors we feel he was one of us, we were a part of his larger sphere of influence and, therefore, his passing while still in the active years of life is most keenly felt.

Provisional circumstances put him in a larger field of usefulness, but he was one of us. He shared our hopes and ambitions, met our difficulties, strived to worthily attain, and rejoiced in his wanted measure of success.

His work will remain as an inspiration to others who are permitted to carry on with high and worthy purpose toward the goal of human achievement.

WOMAN CANDIDATE ANNOUNCES PLATFORM

Dorothy McCullough Lee, Portland attorney and only woman candidate for the legislature from Multnomah county is opposed to freak laws and she elected will exert an "Earnest Effort for Sensible Legislation."

In discussing her candidacy she states that in her opinion state legislators can render more service to the people if they will concern themselves with constructive legislation which will help all of the people to obtain the most from the natural resources of the state rather than with the promotion or fostering of their own ideas and beliefs.

She believes that it is impossible for any governing body to create prosperity by the simple process of enacting laws but announces her faith in the ability of the people, assisted or protected when necessary by practical legislation to create for themselves prosperity and well being.

Mrs. Lee believes that in as much as a great part of the electorate is composed of women they are entitled to some representation. Problems concerned with the social and educational welfare of the people are constantly arising and on such occasions the viewpoints or ideas of women are particularly valuable.

It is, therefore, right for the women to ask that they have some one in the legislature to whom they can go with these ideas feeling that their thought will be understood and appreciated.

Mrs. Lee, however, opposes the idea of voting for any woman merely because she is a woman but believes she should be voted for or against solely on the basis of her qualifications. She also feels that women with the necessary experience are equally qualified with men to represent the people.

Dorothy McCullough Lee's platform and slogan follow:

"The responsibilities and duties of a representative are indeed serious public trusts and if elected to this office I will exert my best efforts in behalf of the people as their representative."

I will favor only such truly constructive legislation as will help to bring about the proper development of the natural resources of our state and which will promote the general educational and social welfare of its people.

I will support measures that offer a practical solution and equitable readjustment of the tax problems.
