### CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN PREVENTS INFECTION

From the headquarters of the Infection Control association at San Francisco comes some timely information along the line of conserving the millions of dollars wasted annually through the damage wrought by insects and molds. The farmers' section of the association, is promoting a clean-up campaign among the farmers of Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Colorado and Utah to last from May 7 to May 27.

The outline for the growers' section of the campaign will include the clean-up of barns, outhouses, fruit and vegetable sheds and bins from May 7-11; the cleaning out of lug boxes and trays and disinfecting with sterilizing chemicals, May 12-17; the burning of culled and rotting produce, May 18-23; the removal of decaying fruit and stacking of good fruit so that it will get plenty of fresh air, May 24-27.

Insects are attracted to fruit and vegetables that are molding and decaying. By protecting produce from mold, it will lose its attraction for spoilage-spreading and producing insects. The canners and packers of these six states are doing everything in their power to reduce insect infestation and mold. Each farmer is asked to do his bit to help make the campaign a success.
