

Wolfe Has Record for Honest Service

On the ballot for Multnomah county court officers to be nominated next Friday will be found three names for clerk of the district court. One of them is Edward R. Wolfe.

If efficient and honest service in government and state positions count as they should there is no doubt that Mr. Wolfe will be nominated for this responsible position. He is a resident of Portland and for several years was a government employe in the treasury department and the department of labor. Later he was a deputy in the state fire marshal's office. In these positions he handled many thousands of dollars of public funds and always with strict economy and fidelity. He standardized the fire fighting equipment throughout the state. The lowest estimate made by mechanical engineers for this work was \$30,000. Through his knowledge of economy and efficiency Mr. Wolfe finished the work satisfactorily to all at a saving to the state of \$16,000 under the estimate.

Mr. Wolfe asserts that during 1926 and 1927 over \$5700 of public funds was misappropriated by the former clerk of the district court of this county, and he urges that the voters consider his record for honesty and efficiency in choosing a clerk for this district court.

BLUE LAKE DROWNING TRAGEDY AVERTED

Conflicting reports have been given of the near drowning of two boys, George McAllister of Gresham and John Langley of Fairview, the accident taking place in Blue lake last Tuesday evening. But for the heroic effort of Clair Stockton, Virgil Langley and William Schmierer, it is more than possible the affair would have ended disastrously.

Several boys were playing on a raft in the lake, probably 15 feet out and where the water was about 12 feet in depth. One of the number started to swim to shore when he met McAllister who was swimming out to the raft. The boy was evidently tired and about to give out and grappled McAllister, nearly drawing him down. In the tussle that ensued both McAllister and Langley were rescued and drawn to the shore where they were given first aid by their companions. None was much worse off for the experience excepting a nervous shock, due in part to the extremely cold water of the lake.

Brownell Points to Good Record

WEEK EMPHASIZES AIR TRANSPORTATION

Attention of the public is called to the fact that this week is recognized as air mail week. The latest method of transporting the United States mail to and from its destination is through the air by means of the last word in airplane construction and by the aid of trusty pilots. After 10 years of this service this department is no longer an innovation and is recognized as a permanent means of transportation.

Twenty-two routes are now in operation with five others under contract and scheduled for operation during the current year. The total mileage of the air-mail system is now 12,550 miles, with an additional 1350 miles under advisement. Air-mail pilots are flying every day a total distance of 22,110 miles. The progress of the air mail service during the past 10 years is a great means of gratification to Uncle Sam.

Air-mail postage is 10 cents for each half ounce or fraction thereof, from point of origin to destination.

Cucumbers Wanted.
