Rand for Justice of Supreme Court

When an agitation arises over the fairness of a justice of the supreme court on the eve of a political election in which he is a candidate, and in spite of the conclusion of an unofficial investigating committee, there is likely to be an unfavorable prejudice in the minds of many voters. Justice Rand welcomed the investigation and "laid all his cards on the table."

If any uncertainty exists in the minds of any as to the integrity of Justice Rand it may be cleared up in his favor by asking whether or not the move has a political animus and whether or not Joseph and Mannix had a clean, unselfish purpose.

There are three names on the ballot for the two places on the supreme bench. The candidates are, Chief Justice Rand, for re-election; Associate Justice George Rossman, appointed by Governor Patterson, now up for election, and L. H. McMahan of Marion county, a circuit judge.

There isn't a cloud on the character or record of Judge George Rossman. He is straight and clean and capable. It would be a misfortune not to retain him in so important a place. We cannot recommend him too highly and it is urged by all good citizens that he be given a heavy vote.

For the second choice it is urged that Chief Justice Rand be the choice. It is believed that in spite of the recent agitation against Judge Rand that he is a more capable and safer man than the other.

Attorneys who practice before the supreme court learn to know and appreciate the character of the men who sit as the final arbiters of legal tangles. The Outlook asked for an impartial opinion from the two attorneys in Gresham. They did not wish their names mentioned but they both gave Justice Rand a high recommendation. One says that from his contact with the men on the supreme bench he has formed a most favorable opinion of them and that Justice Rand shares with the other members of the court his high esteem for honesty, integrity and faithful attention to duty. He feels that the attack on Justice Rand was most unjust.

The other attorney says he believes Judge Rand to be a man of high character. He says there may have been some slight grounds which were seized by Joseph and Mannix to bring pressure to bear on Rand. He believes the Oregonian made a mistake in naming a private committee to investigate the character of the chief justice. He thinks it should have come before the bar association or some other such organization. He thinks nothing can come of the investigation but damage to Rand's candidacy and a distrust of the Oregon bench and bar.

ALLAN A. BYNON FOR LEGISLATURE



Allan A. Bynon is a candidate on the republican ticket, Multnomah county, for state representative.

An intense desire to acquire a good education and amount to something in the world was the early goal of Allan A. Bynon, now running for the legislature as a republican candidate for representative from Multnomah county. Spurred on by this ambition, the future barrister developed very early in life a capacity for hard work which is today perhaps his outstanding character as a practicing attorney.

As a boy of seven, Allan A. Bynon learned to set and distribute type and at nine he could feed a job press expertly. At the age of 12, he worked all through the summer months in order to get clothes so that he could finish grammar school. Entering Salem high school at 13, he graduated at 17 and during that period he never knew what it was to have a vacation. During the two years that followed at Eugene, as a student of the University of Oregon, he continued to work to earn his education. He clerked in a shoe store, was agent for a laundry, and performed other tasks, while during the summer vacation he shoveled gravel as a member of a construction gang, and labored at hop dryers.


Allan A. Bynon entered Willamette University when he was 19 years old and completed the three-year law course in two years, largely owing to the fact that Charles L. McNary, now United States senator, gave the young man the benefit of his personal tutelage. While at Willamette the necessity for funds to complete his education persisted, but the youthful disciple of Blackstone did not flinch at the tasks set him. "Labor stands on feet of gold," was his motto and this maxim he proceeded to put into practice by working during his spare time for the Marion creamery as cream tester, then as traveling salesman selling butter and buying eggs and cream over pretty nearly the entire western part of the state. Finally he succeeded in getting a position in the business office of the Statesmen Publishing company of Salem, specializing on special features and advertising.

Graduating from Willamette law school in the spring of 1917, at the age of 21, Allan A. Bynon was happily contemplating the chance to put his hard-won legal education into practice, when the United States joined the allies. Abandoning all his cherished plans, Bynon immediately volunteered, signed up for the first officers' training camp, was commissioned a second lieutenant, and went overseas with the A. E. F. There he served 18 months, being discharged from the service after the armistice with the rank of captain. Upon his return to Oregon, Bynon served a year with the Oregon National Guard as captain and adjutant of the 1st Battalion of Coast Artillery. The following year, 1921, he was appointed attorney for Marion county of the World War veterans' state aid commission.

Bynon served as assistant United States attorney, and in 1924 and 1925 as first assistant. Since that time he has been engaged in the practice of law.

WILBER HENDERSON FOR REPRESENTATIVE.

When he was elected two years ago he declared it to be his purpose to answer every roll call of the legislative session, and attend strictly to legislative business; to study both sides of each measure presented, then vote my honest convictions; to listen to the wants and needs of the people of the state, then vote for their best interest.
