**Cassell Is Sound on Automotive Tax**

"The \$3 automobile license fee, three months ago a distinct threat against the integrity of Oregon's magnificent state highway system, is losing ground so rapidly that it is no longer a menace" reports Jas. H. Cassell, editor of Automotive News and member of the executive committee of the Oregon Good Roads association.

He says: Mr. Cassell, former newspaper man, editor, business organization executive, ex-service man, taxpayer and recognized authority on motor vehicle regulation and taxation, is a candidate for the lower house from Multnomah county. His knowledge and progressive conservatism are advanced as reasons why he can be of service to the state in highway financing as well as other important tax subjects to be considered by the next legislature.

"Champions of the \$3 license fee plan were mostly people who were not at all in favor of a \$3 license, but espoused because of their dissatisfaction with the present high license. With nothing else to vote for they were willing to ballot for the \$3 fee, realizing full well that it means excessive gas tax and more real property tax, just to register a protest against the legislature's refusal to modify the highway financing plan of the state," continues Cassell.

"But the \$3 agitation has a constructive phase: It has awakened people to the need of a readjustment in motor vehicle taxation that will protect our highways—permit no decrease in revenue—but will make the tax easier to pay. People don't tie their cars up during January, February and March because they choose to. It's because they haven't the money to pay a high license fee.

"With Governor Patterson, the highway commissioners, Treasurer Kay and other leaders throughout the state advocating sane and protective tax readjustment, it has become apparent that the next legislature will modify the present license fee system. Realization of this is responsible for wholesale desertions from the ranks of the \$3 license fee clan, leaving only willful destructionists and those who have no understanding of our highway system, what it means to the state, and its requirements in dollars.

"The organization of the Oregon Good Roads association, under the leadership of John B. Yeon, one of the fathers of Oregon's modern highway system, is indicative of the necessity for protecting our highways. While formed primarily to fight such destructive things as the \$3 license fee, my prediction is that this group, comprising good roads chiefs from every part of the state, will present a motor vehicle tax program to the next legislature. That program will iron out inequities in the tax system and recognize more emphatically the ability of people to pay.

"I am confident that the 1929 legislature will enact a sound, intelligent, highway-protective tax law, encouraging greater use of the motor vehicle throughout the year by making it easier for the average motorist to pay his tax."

**HORSES STOLEN FROM GILLIS RESIDENTS**

Two residents of the Gillis neighborhood are regretting the loss of horses from their premises, there being every indication that the animals were stolen, in one case from the barn and in the other from a pasture. Sometime during Friday night an 11-year-old horse, "Dexter", was taken from his stall in the barn of J. W. Hudson living south of Gillis station. The barn had been securely fastened in the evening and the horse's bridle snapped to the stall. He is described as a bay, with black mane and tail and weighing between 1000 and 1100 pounds. The animal has saddle marks on his left side.

Two horses belonging to Fred Steigler disappeared from their pasture on the T. H. Hawes farm the same evening and nothing can be learned of their whereabouts.

The owners of the three horses share the opinion of others in the community that the animals have been stolen. Shortly before day-break Saturday morning Mrs. Hudson was awakened by the violent barking of their dog, but was unable to locate the cause of the disturbance. At about the same time in the night a heavy truck was heard in the neighborhood and horses were heard to be running wildly about. Coupling all these circumstantial points together, it is thought that the animals did not leave of their own accord.
