Bennett Will Win in Race for Senate

Hard work, backed by good character and ability, will put anyone to the front and it is putting J. E. FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE



Faithful and efficient service in any line merits promotion. It is on this ground that Judge Stadter, for some time senior municipal judge of Portland, seeks the circuit judgeship, Dept. No. 1, and his host of friends are giving him their hearty support. As a man he has a judicial temperament and sterling qualities. As a judge he is experienced and has shown marked ability. He is a close student and a hard worker. In fact, this sums up his life's history while passing through the school of experience in which he was early thrown on his own responsibility. Judge Stadter was born on a farm and had only country school advantages, which usually handicap even the most ambitious, but Fred Stadter worked his way through school, high school, college and law. Before completing his education he decided that he wanted to see the pyramids and some of the old world, so he took civil service examination for United States departmental service at large. He was appointed and sent to Angel Island, in the commissary department, where he remained for a year and a half. Later, in 1903, he was transferred to Manila, where he remained for three years before he was ordered back to the United States. It was at this time that he exerted all effort to secure permission to visit various points of interest at his own expense before returning to the United States, and was successful in persuading the "colonel" in charge. While in governmental service he visited points of interest in the Orient, as well as practically every foreign country. He came to Portland in 1910 and has been active in the practice of law here ever since. In 1913 he was appointed deputy city attorney, which position he filled until three years ago when he was appointed judge of the municipal court. When Judge W. A. Ekwall was elected to the circuit court he became senior municipal judge, which position he has filled with great credit. The municipal court is a school in itself from which men who are made of the right kind of material graduate into the higher courts. Judge George Rossman was on the municipal bench for several years ahead of Judge Ekwall and today he is making a splendid record in the supreme court of Oregon. In the municipal courts are brought the human elements in all stages of degradation. It offers human nature as it is found under environment of all kinds. In this position, perhaps more than any other court of the land, the judge is called upon to exercise "good common sense" in dispensing justice. This experience broadens his view point and creates an understanding by contact with human nature in its varied classifications that is not possible through the reading of books or otherwise. Together with this qualification, Fred Stadter is a student. He is a man who keeps well informed on all important decisions. Having come up from the "bottom," he understands and appreciates all phases of predicaments that human beings become involved in. He is also conscientiously interested in public welfare and all civic matters. He is a great fraternalist, is a member of nearly all the fraternal organizations represented in Portland. He is president of the Mazamas, and was one of the leaders in the search for young Brownlee lost on Mt. Hood. He is greatly interested in promoting the winter sports on Mt. Hood. His many friends believe him eminently worthy of the position to which he aspires and that he has earned and deserves promotion to the circuit court bench.
