

Erick Unis Passes; Heart Failure Cause

Erick Unis died at his home a mile east of Boring, Friday, May 18, from an attack of heart disease. Funeral services were held at the Saron Lutheran church Monday, with interment following in Lincoln Memorial park under the direction of the Gates Funeral Home.

Mr. Unis was born in Stabacka, Nerpes, Finland, December 4, 1869. He came to America in 1889 and settled at Anaconda, Mont. Here in 1897 he was married to Miss Marie Anderson. To this union seven children were born, all of whom are living. They came to Oregon in 1902 and have lived since that time in Powell Valley, Portland and near Boring. Mr. Unis has been a member of the Saron Lutheran church since 1905.

The deceased is survived by seven children, Mrs. Frieda Premo, Mrs. Esther Willing, Mrs. Elsie Norton, Miss Helen Unis, Walter, Ivar and Alvar Unis, also five grandchildren. Two brothers, Charlie and Otto, and two sisters, Johanna and Josephine, reside in Finland.
