The most conservative and traditionally aristocratic ideas regarding woman's place in the world and the most modern progressive will be brought in contrast next October in San Antonio, Texas, when the expected 10,000 women of the general federation of women's clubs and the expected 40,000 more of the American Legion auxiliary meet in that old city for their respective conventions.

1 The average mile of steam railroad in the United States carries each day seven freight trains and seven passenger trains consisting of a total of 325 freight cars and 46 passenger cars. The net income of the average mile is \$13 a day which is 4 1/2 per cent interest on the investment.

2 This country has 26 per cent of all the Jews of the world, or 3,572,419. In New York city alone there are 1,643,012. In the last 10 years the Jews in this country have increased 500,000, twice as fast as in Europe with a total of 10,903,864 and an increase of but 900,000.

3 The New Zealander is the wealthiest world citizen with an average of \$3,317.70 per capita and fairly well distributed. The Swiss comes next with an average of \$2,998.20 per capita and the United States third with \$2,941.90. Surprisingly to the most of us Rumania comes fourth with \$2,808.90 per capita, but not well distributed.

4 The heaviest per capita national debt is carried by Great Britain and is \$914.20. New Zealand comes with a debt of \$829.70. France owes \$458.20 and the United States \$155.20 per capita.

5 The cost of living figured on a pre-war basis of 100 is highest in Rumania which is 3,900; Bulgaria is next with 2,698; Greece next with 1,694. On the same basis the cost of living in the United States was last year 173; in Great Britain 169; in France 607 and in Germany, 150. The lowest living costs are in Austria 109; Hungary, 112 and Poland 130.9.

6 In 1927 the United States spent for defense (not including other war costs such as pensions, interest on war debts, etc.) \$679,709,000; Great Britain, \$567,427,000; Russia, \$347,580,000; China \$297,703,000; France, \$269,463,000. Treaties to outlaw war would save these five nations a yearly bill of more than two billion dollars.

George W. Landon Laid to Final Rest

Impressive funeral services were held Friday at the Methodist Episcopal church for the late George W. Landon, who passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. William Stanley, May 23, aged 94 years, 4 months and 12 days.

A remarkable feature of the gathering was the large number of the descendants present and the fact that the pallbearers, six active and four honorary, were all young men, grandsons of the deceased. Mr. Landon had expressed the wish that his grandsons act as his pallbearers. There were more than 50 members of his family present, including six children, 26 grandchildren and their husbands and wives, and 14 great grandchildren. Of the entire number, only two were absent. The pallbearers were Earl and Ralph Stanley, Harry and Orville Spath, George Pullen and Robert Booth, active, William Booth, Oren Stanley, Byron Pullen and Glen Spath, honorary.

The services were in charge of the Rev. H. V. Wilhelm, who read the scripture and offered prayer. The sermon was by the Rev. S. G. Fahnestock of Portland Church of the Brethren, Dunkard, who took for his text the words of the aged Simeon, "Now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace". D. M. Cathey, who had known Mr. Landon for 45 years, spoke briefly of him as a good neighbor and a man of high character and religious faith. Music was furnished by a quartet composed of C. E. Rusher, Mrs. Elsie Cogswell, Mrs. E. W. Ayisworth and Leslie Walrad, with Miss Amy Cooper as accompanist. The hymns sung were "Rock of Ages," "The End of the Road," and "Abide With Me."

Interment was in Douglas cemetery.

Mr. Landon was a native of Blunsville, Tenn. On March 15, 1866, he married Miss Elizabeth Henkle. They lived together until February 10, 1911, when Mrs. Landon passed away at their home near Gresham. The Landons came to Oregon in 1882 and lived at Brooks for the first year, when they settled near Pleasant Home. They later lived for a year on the Fred Ruegg place on Pleasant View avenue and still later at Rockwood, where Mr. Landon owned and operated a blacksmith shop. In 1898 they moved to a farm on what is known as Birdsdales avenue, where they lived until the death of Mrs. Landon. Since then Mr. Landon has lived in the homes of his daughters, where he has been given the tenderest care.

He was wonderfully well preserved for a man of his years, in spite of the fact that after he was 80 years of age one of his legs was amputated at the knee because of a malady from which he had suffered for years. His hearing was good and his sight was so good that he was able to read newspaper headlines without glasses up to the time of his severe illness last December. In January he suffered a stroke of paralysis. His daughters declared that his patience was remarkable and that he never complained of his lot.

Mr. Landon was a veteran of the Civil war. He enlisted in the Confederate army at the beginning of the war and served to the end.

The surviving sons and daughters are S. J. Landon of Portland, Mrs. Laura Pullen and Mrs. Josephine Stanley of Gresham, Mrs. Lola Spath of Seaside, E. D. Landon of Centralia, Washington and Mrs. Effie Booth of Boring.
