As evidence of the growing importance of the used car, says R. H. Grant, vice president of the Chevrolet Motor company, according to Jack Shearer, local dealer, it is pointed out that during the first quarter of 1928 the Chevrolet dealers of the country, while moving 250,000 new cars, delivered at retail more than 200,000 used automobiles. This was made possible by a changing attitude toward the used car on the part both of the automobile dealer and the public, it is said.

Of some 25,000,000 passenger

cars now registered in the United States it is estimated that approximately 60 per cent are in the hands of their second or third owners. In other words, 15,000,000 motorists are now riding in cars that were purchased on resale. Eliminate the used car from the market and a goodly share of those millions would be denied the use of a car, while most of the 10,000,000 remaining would be driving automobiles that do not measure up to their ideas of style simply because they could get no trade-in allowance and would refuse to scrap their cars with unused value remaining in them, says an authority.

There is one motor vehicle for every 5.13 persons in the United States, according to information compiled by the bureau of public roads, U. S. department of agriculture. Registration of motor vehicles has increased enormously in the past three years, and last year more than 23,000,000 motor vehicles were registered, the numbers in the different states ranging all the way from 25,776 in Nevada to 1,937,918 in New York state. Receipts from motor vehicle registrations mean substantial sums for road building and consequently better roads.

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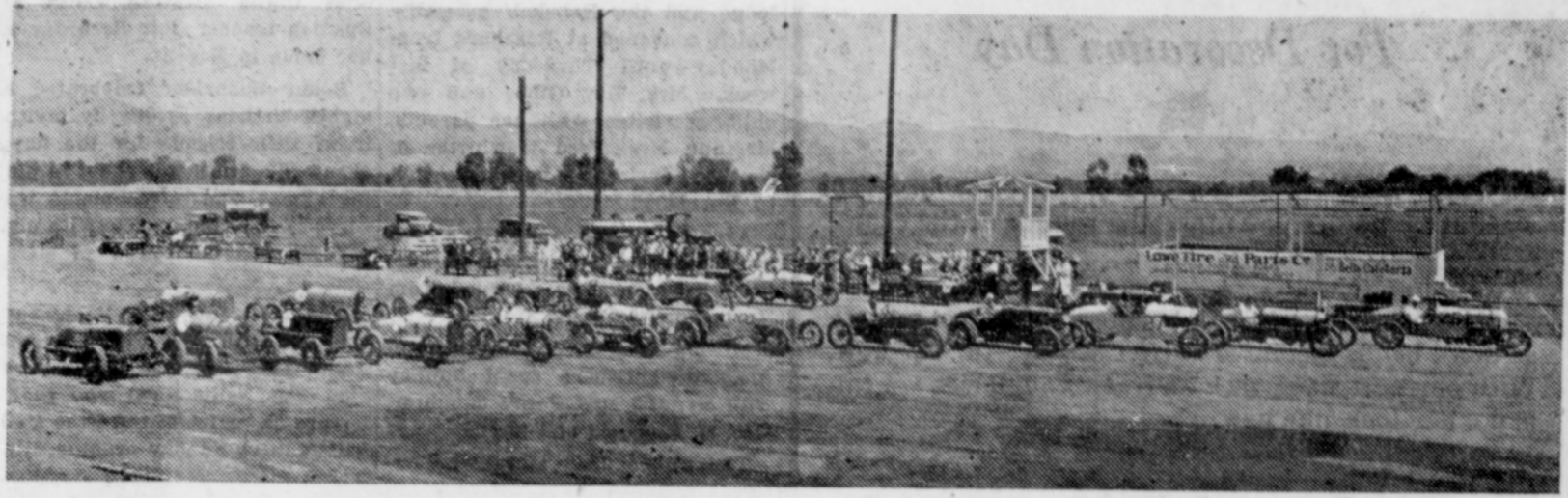
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HURLBURT
