Handwriting Expert Warns the Unwary

THE MORTGAGED LOADED REALTY.

This is the second article by Mr. Williams, of Portland, a handwriting expert and examiner of questioned documents, in which he gives valuable advice on such matters based on his extended experience.

A husband and wife had struggled for a week against the obstructions of opposing attorneys and the technicalities of the law to establish evidence that they had been defrauded in a real estate deal. There were three or four defendants and each had played his part to perpetrate a cruel deal which took away from a confiding, simple minded and unsophisticated man ad wife their livelihood—their last piece of property which made them paupers in a strange city dependent upon the small wages of a sister.

On the witness stand the wife broke down and wept bitterly as she related the sad story and it was whispered around by defendants and their friends that she was faking the tears. Suddenly the judge granted a non-suit and ordered the jury to report to another department for service. The husband and wife seemed dazed and wondered why the jury and audience were leaving the room.

Suddenly there was a moan and a stir and I turned—what was taking place. The wife had fainted and was unconscious with the palor of death on her face, resting in the arms of her husband. As I left the room three or four men were carrying her limp form into the judge's chamber to revive her. A realization of a higher duty to humanity than to prove writing in court came to me. I resolved then and there to expose the methods of those who are "just within the law" but who have lost all human instincts.

Here is a brief synopsis of one of the many tragedies I meet in my work. Husband and wife in middle life resolved to trade 320 acres of land for income property in Portland. Their property was not encumbered and worth \$6000 or more. They came to Portland as strangers and went to a real estate firm and put their case up to them. In a few days another agent joined the first firm in the deal and took husband and wife to a small town near Portland and showed them property for \$13,500 with a mortgage of \$7500. The testimony proved beyond a doubt that the property mortgaged for \$7500 was not the property they had bought and would be difficult to realize that for it. The value of the 320 acres was added to the mortgage thus making the sale price \$13,500. The property was not income

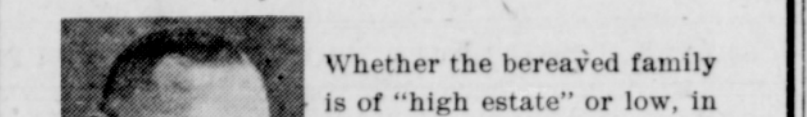
