Mrs. Elton Eastman left this morning for Oakland, Calif., for a visit with a sister who resides there.

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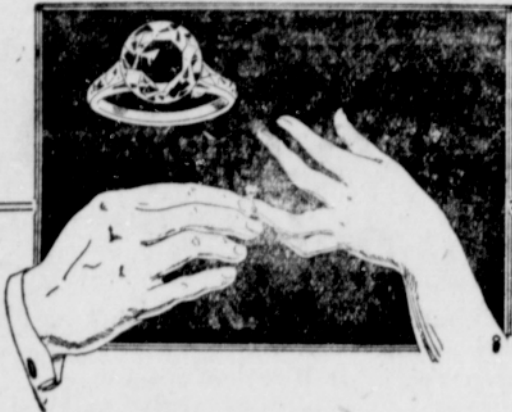
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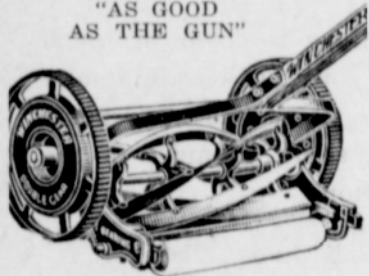
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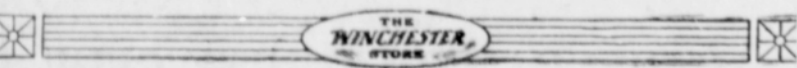
