The Coos Bay Harbor, published at North Bend, mentions that the secretary of state has apportioned the agricultural fair fund to the various counties, giving Coos county about \$1400 and Curry county \$321 and the above paper remarks that the latter county may devote the fair fund to highway maintenance.

The state grange which met last week at Rainier chose Coos Bay for its next year's meeting place.

Grange Master Speaks. State Master Geo. A. Palmer, in addressing the state grange at Rainier recently, said: "The trouble is that industry and labor are not protected. Farmers are not and they never will be as long as they remain unorganized." In urging co-operation, he said that only about 30 cents of the consumer's dollar is now returned to the farmer. He thinks freight rates are unfair because based on weight without consideration of value. Regarding taxes, he declared: "All taxes should be levied on ability to pay, for any other basis means simply confiscation. There is plenty of wealth in Oregon to pay all taxes without placing a burden upon any one."

COUNTY FAIR FUND IS APPORTIONED. Secretary of State Sam A. Koser has announced the apportionment of the county fair fund to the various counties of the state, Multnomah county of course receiving the largest share. The fund this year totalled \$66,220.82 and was apportioned among counties in proportion to the amount of the tax raised in each county, with the exception of Multnomah county, whose participation is limited to \$18,500, the balance of the tax raised in this county, amounting to \$3,985.56, being equally divided between all of the counties of the state, each county receiving \$109.32 as its share. The fund is available for use in support of any fair, land products show or livestock exhibition, or, in the event no such fair is held in any county, the money may be diverted to the county road fund.

As the new civilization was described in realistic form and the conflict between capital and labor settled in a greswome conflict we remarked to our college friends as we discussed the book, "How fantastic! how impossible! how idealistic!"

Doubtless the little social discussion which was so delightful and common in college circles would end with the remark, "Just another good citizen gone nutty."

What happened last night when millions of people sat in their comfortable chairs at home and heard the nominating speeches, heard the actual votes of the different states as they were announced by Chairman Moses at Kansas City and had the result several minutes before it was actually officially announced was predicted by Edward Bellamy half a century ago. What a miracle! But we have every reason to believe that still more wonderful things are just before us. No more do doubting Thomases obstruct the onward march of inventive, creative brain. The achievement of the day is surpassed on the morrow. It takes a brave person to be a doubter in the presence of the demonstration of the developments of yesterday.

A few decades ago all suggestion of possible improvements met with scoffing and the cold stare. Today everyone mentions this or that as lagging behind other developments and are anxious to bespeak its success.

We are indeed living in a different atmosphere. The radio brings us closer together. The moral and spiritual principles will have greater opportunity and facilities to overcome selfishness and corruption.

The challenge which comes to the inventor, the scientist, the creative mind in education, the spiritual leader, the statesman, the reformer, bulks big. Not only are the means and equipment available but the people are receptive, sympathetic, indeed, they have the glad hand constantly extended with faith believing that a new blessing for humanity is incubating.
