### Inter-State Air Line Started



The above picture shows one of the huge Ryan monoplanes which will be used in the new Washington-Oregon passenger and express service, connecting Yakima and Portland. The planes are luxuriously upholstered four-passenger ships. On the left is Tex Rankin, chief pilot and head of the Rankin Flying service which is operating the line. On the right is Mrs. Margaret Porter, pioneer of Yakima, who made the trip on the opening day.

Portland, Or.—(Special) — The first inter-state air express and passenger service in the Northwest was started June 2 between Portland and Yakima, linking the great inland territory of Washington with the Oregon seaport. A regular two-hour service will operate between the two cities. Two new Ryan cabin planes will be used on the run, which is operated by the Rankin Flying Service of Portland.

The huge monoplanes, under the personal supervision of Tex Rankin, the Northwest's leading aviator, will fly up the Columbia Gorge to Cascade Locks and then by direct line to Yakima. The whole trip takes less than two hours, where the other means of transportation takes five times that long. The planes are capable of a cruising speed of 120 miles an hour. ### JURY ACQUITS DRIVER IN FATAL ACCIDENT

A coroner's jury, sitting in the case of the state against Vern Alexander, driver of the car which struck Henry A. Runge, 71, causing his death near Pleasant Home on June 6, brought a verdict of unavoidable accident.

Testimony brought out the fact that Runge, who had been picking berries on the Herman Smith place, was walking in the middle of the road, and the young man made every effort to avoid hitting him. The man was struck by a fender of the car.

The jury was composed entirely of Portland people. The witnesses were Henry Hemmers, a Mr. Newton, E. G. Lowe, a minister; H. J. Paape, M. M. Squire, deputy sheriff who investigated the accident, Dr. A. W. Botkin, a Mr. Crosier and Don Hutchins. The latter was riding with Alexander. Lyle Brown, deputy district attorney, appeared for the state at the inquest and C. G. Schneider for Alexander.
