The Juvenile hospital for girls, which has just been completed on Barker road between the Base Line and Sandy boulevard at a cost of \$60,000, was dedicated Friday, with prominent officials present to assist in the ceremony.

This hospital will be operated in connection with the Louise Home, and will fill a long-felt want in caring for the many girls who find their way to this haven of refuge. Funds for the building and equipment were furnished by the state legislature, various county courts and public spirited citizens working in conjunction with church and other organizations.

Governor Patterson, Mayor Baker of Portland, Hugh H. Herdman representing the community chest, the Rev. W. G. MacLaren, founder of the Louise Home and superintendent of the Pacific Protective society, were among those present.

This hospital is the only organization in the west specializing in this particular hospitalization.
