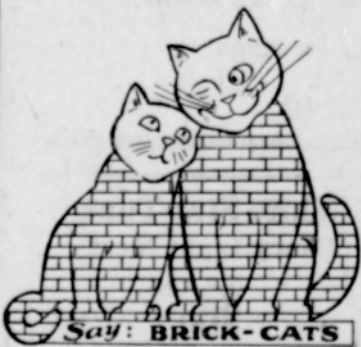

Mr. and Mrs. Steve Wright are the proud parents of a nine-pound girl born to them June 27. Mrs. Wright is staying with relatives in Portland.

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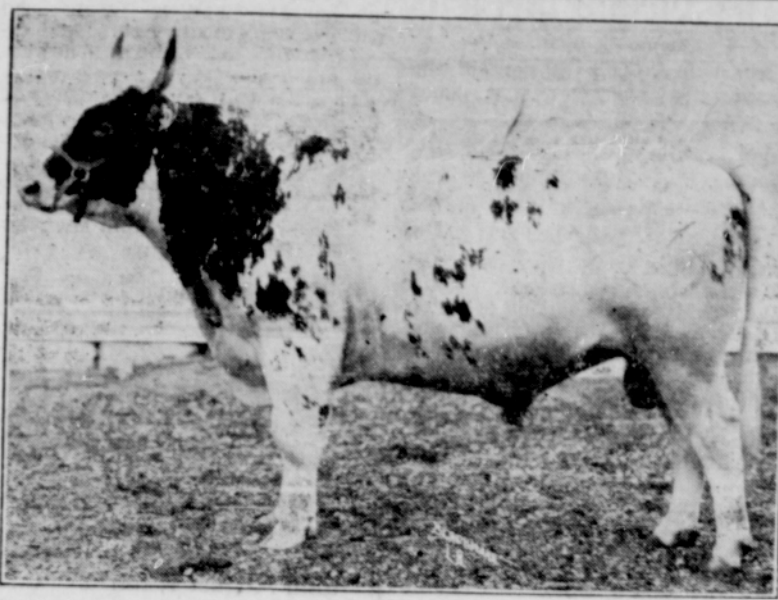
