Telephone Company Will Issue Directory

The issuance of a new telephone directory has been authorized by the West Coast Telephone company, which the first of this month absorbed the old Oregon Telephone company in a consolidation involving the latter, the Coos & Curry Telephone company, the Klamath Telephone company, the Camas & Washougal Telephone company, the Puget Sound Telephone company, the Home Independent Telephone company, the Union & Wallowa Telephone company and the Montesano Telephone company.

This book, which will be off the press within a reasonable time, will contain all changes made up to date in number, additions to the subscribers' list and removals. The need of a directory twice during the year is deemed necessary by the new management of the telephone company, and will be a regular feature of the department from now on. With but a single book a year, too many number changes are posted on the operating board, resulting in many wrong calls and unavoidable traffic errors.

With the consolidation of the independent companies in Washington and Oregon, the reorganization of which will not be fully completed before August 1, a much better standard of service is assured the public. The most modern methods and equipment obtainable will be installed in the offices of the new building. It is expected that this equipment will be in operation by February 1st of the coming year.

In commenting on the exchange boards of the former Oregon Telephone company, a prominent official of the company said this was the largest magneto board he had ever seen and marveled at the ability of the operators to give anything like satisfactory service with the equipment at their disposal. The old style magneto will be replaced by an improved battery service, with a new numbering system. The entire area will be rebuilt and the service improved in every particular.

William E. Everett of Everett, Wash., supervisor of directories, has spent much time in Gresham lately in connection with the compilation of the new directory. J. C. Foster, also of Everett, is general traffic manager of the new company and has materially assisted in everything pertaining to the consolidation and reorganization of its affairs.
