

Halcyon Farm Owner Dies at Arrah Wanna

John L. Bowman, aged 60, president of the Brownsville Woolen mills in Portland, also owner of the Halcyon farm in Powell Valley, died at his summer home at Arrah Wanna, near Welches, Wednesday afternoon from heart disease. Mr. Bowman, a prominent busi-

ness man and promoter of various civic enterprises, was more or less known in this part of the county. His beautiful farm, once devoted to the Jersey dairying business, is one of the show farms in this locality. The place has been for several years under the management of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Wrenn, who went to Portland today to attend the funeral. Mr. Bowman is survived by his widow and four children.
