BOY'S DEATH LAID TO POISONED BRAN

As a result of the findings of the Oregon Medical school chemist in connection with the sudden death of Raymond Woodrow Brown, aged 9, which occurred at a house adjoining the county fair grounds July 17, it has been definitely determined that death was due to eating bran containing strychnine.

It appears that the poison had been placed in horse feed for the purpose of putting more life and vigor into the race horses at the fair. The boy had ready access to the barns as his father is here with horses for the fair. Twenty minutes after he had swallowed the bran he was seized with convulsions and died shortly afterward. Following an autopsy in charge of the county coroner, portions of the boy's stomach were examined and proof of the strychnine poisoning found. An effort is being made to fix the responsibility for carelessness in leaving poison in a child's way.

Funeral services were held at the J. E. Metzger chapel Saturday afternoon and interment made in Douglas cemetery. The lad is survived by his parents and six brothers and sisters, among whom 's a brother named Harry, who has been erroneously mentioned as the deceased.
