Three special prizes have been added to the list as published in the premium list. W. V. Quivey of Portland is offering a junior white New Zealand, and a junior white New Zealand doe on the best display of Chinchillas. Judge N. I. White of La Center, Wash., is giving a Havana junior doe for the best Chinchilla senior buck. A rabbit auction will be held tomorrow on the grounds between 1 and 4:30 o'clock under the auspices of the American Rabbit & Cavy Breeders association. Some of the largest prize winners on the coast will be entered.

Everyone on the fair grounds is interested in poultry to the extent at least of visiting the exhibit in the old pavilion. A nice class of Anconas is being exhibited, one of which is an outstanding bird, a cock brought here by D. P. Law of Portland, superintendent of the department. Another fine bird is a dark Barred Rock cockerel owned by Irwin of Sacramento, Calif. One of the best Rhode Island Red young bands which has been shown for many years is owned by La Gette, Canby. The largest and best exhibit of bantams ever shown at the county fair is on the grounds. There is a fine display of poultry from the boys' and girls' clubs. Ducks, turkeys and pigeons figure in the exhibit this year. George W. Irwin of Florin, Calif., is here with 62 birds. He has 18 varieties of bantams and eight of large birds. He will go from here to Lynden, Wash.
