Miss Lois Trimble is being treated for sinus trouble in Good Samaritan hospital in Portland.

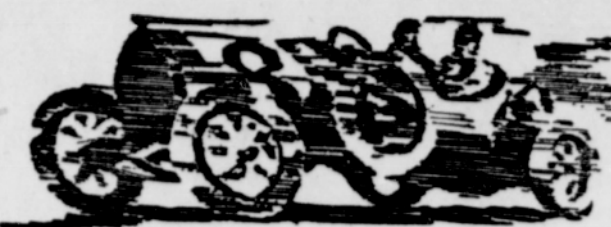

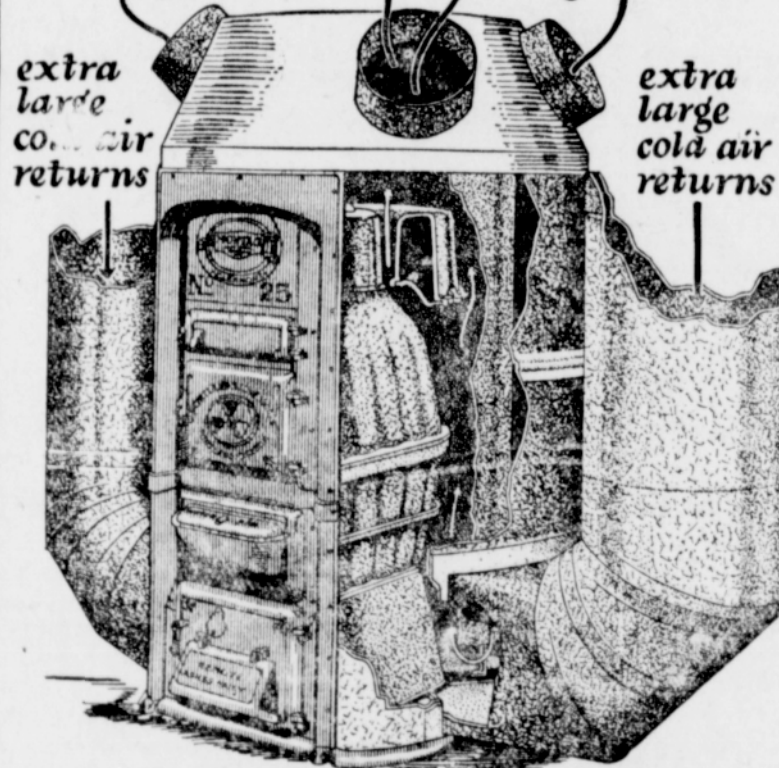
