At that moment the "Ain't it a grand and glorious feeling" expression certainly went home. The realization came to me that I was not hurt. Was pinned in so tight that I could not move. Found afterwards that the reason for that was one of the telephone poles had broken off at the ground when the plane struck, had turned a flip flop in the air and had landed across the top of my head. The crash helmet I had did the work that time.

In a few days the news reels had shown the pictures of the crash on the screen and I had a call to come to the New York office of one of the moving picture studios. From there I went to Hollywood where I have been doing work for the studios. One crash I did for one of the studios did not turn out as I had planned. Had to hit the building in a cross wind which caused the plane to crash sidewise and wrapped one of the top wings across the top of my head. There was no serious damage done; only had a couple of blue spots to remember it by.

Am going to attempt it again at the Multnomah county fair grounds on Labor Day, September 2, under the auspices of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, state department. This time the building will be one of white stucco. It will be the first attempt to fly a plane into a stucco house, but I have been told so many times that it would be suicide to attempt a crash of that kind that I want to find out if it really will be.

This will probably be the only time the crash will be staged in or near Portland as I have to go back to Hollywood this fall to do some work in the picture "War Birds" which will be about a year in the making.

BURNING OF HOUSE BRINGS THIRD DEGREE

Martin Mikkelsen, a farmer living near Sandy, is being held on an open charge in Oregon City and is being questioned by District Attorney Stipp and Deputy State Fire Marshal Pomeroy in connection with the burning of his farm house Wednesday night. Mikkelsen was found by neighbors tied to a fence with baling wire when they rushed to his house to help save it. He wore only his underclothes. He told of being dragged from his bed at night and tied to the fence and of being forced to drink liniment from a bottle, which was found empty beside him. His ankles were bound to one post while a wire from another post bound his neck. His hands were also tied with wire. He was about 300 feet from his burning residence and was located by his groaning when his neighbors came to fight the fire.

The house and contents were completely destroyed. Insurance of \$1500 was carried.

Pomeroy arrived Thursday morning in Oregon City and, not being satisfied with the story told by Mikkelsen on account of the insurance, had him held for questioning. The Banner-Courier says in this connection, "compelling prisoners to go without food and smokes is considered a part of the third degree."
