Dietetic Principles

Carbon and hydrogen are the chemical elements that the body burns to make energy. But these elements cannot be used by the body in their raw state nor in all their combined forms. Petroleum is an excellent fuel for the gasoline engine but when taken into the body it is not affected, and passes out just as it was taken in. The value of any food depends upon its digestibility. The human body can use only a limited class of substances. But some of each class is needed every day. A well-balanced diet means a well-balanced body.—Kansas City Star.

Elimination of Smoke

Among the most effective means of reducing smoke, says an authority, is the public use of light, heat and power, wired and piped from large, centrally located power plants, which have reduced their own smoke leakage to a minimum through elaborate machinery that separates solid matter from the gases before the fumes are expelled into the air. Hand in hand with such model set-ups as this is electrification of railroads, electric cooking in homes, apartments, hotels and restaurants.

Sunshine and Poison

That there may be truth in the belief that poisonous desert snakes are the deadliest is suggested by reports in Popular Science Monthly of two investigators of the French Academy of Sciences. After exposure to ultraviolet rays of light, snake venom, they found, became increasingly fatal. Animals injected with the poison after it had been exposed to the rays succumbed more quickly than others on which ordinary snake poison was used.
