New Supervisor to Visit Rural Schools

Mrs. Ruby S. Brennan has assumed her new duties as rural supervisor of Multnomah county schools. She succeeds Miss Eva Campbell in this position and will be associated with W. C. Alderson, county school superintendent, who will supervise the upper grades, while Mrs. Brennan will supervise the grades from one to six.

Mrs. Brennan was a member of the faculty of Oregon State Normal school at Monmouth last year in the department of child psychology. At a former time she served as primary critic at Oregon Normal school. She has had experience in the Portland school system as primary supervisor. For two years Mrs. Brennan was a member of the primary department at Miss Catlin's school. There are 43 rural schools in Multnomah county and Mrs. Brennan will make frequent visits to each school to assist the teachers with their instruction problems.

Miss Eva Campbell, who was county supervisor last year is well known in this vicinity, having been an instructor in Gresham and Rockwood schools. She is principal this year at Riverdale grade school, where she formerly served for several years.

Mr. Alderson and Mrs. Brennan were calling on schools in this end of the county yesterday, and were in Gresham, where the new supervisor was introduced to a number of people. Mrs. Brennan comes very highly recommended for the new position and is entering into her duties with enthusiasm. She is delighted with the cooperation which she is receiving from the teachers and school officials of the county and expressed her surprise and admiration for the fine school buildings which are the general rule throughout the rural districts.

M. E. Church Buildings Nearing Completion

Work on the Methodist Episcopal church and parsonage is progressing rapidly under the direction of H. E. Holmes, head carpenter, and the Rev. H. V. Wilhelm, who has done all the architectural planning for the project.

The stucco work on both buildings is well under way and is being done by F. S. Smith of Portland, the finish will be white stucco with brown trim. Many workmen are busy on the buildings and the old parsonage has been moved from its location on Powell street between the church and the new parsonage to South Roberts avenue south of the church. Doors, windows and casings are in place and the heating system is being installed.

Gas heat will be used in the entire building as before. In addition to the three gas furnaces already there, a new one is being installed, and two gas heaters will take care of the heating of the auditorium.

The new parsonage is an attractive house of a story and a half, 36 1/2 x 30, with basement under the greater part of it. It contains seven rooms, two of which are in the second story, besides bath, breakfast room and sewing room.

It is planned to hold all services in the church next Sunday, after an absence of eight Sundays, when the services were held in the grade school building.

Preaching services both morning and evening will be in the basement auditorium. The Sunday school will be distributed by departments as follows: beginners in their own new room, the southwest corner of the basement; primary, in the new kitchen, the southeast corner of the basement; junior, the new church parlor, above the new kitchen; intermediates in their old place, the Epworth League room; young people and adults in the basement auditorium.

An effort is being made to bring out a full attendance of members of the Sunday school at the home coming next Sunday and special honors will be given the department making the largest proportionate gain over the last four weeks' attendance.

The Workmen promise that the heating arrangements will be complete and the rooms comfortable.

The Oregon annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church will be held next week, beginning Tuesday, at Hood River. Mr. Wilhelm will be in attendance there during the conference, including Sunday, September 23. The official board in a recent session voted unanimously to request the return of the pastor for another year. C. E. Rusher was elected delegate to the laymen's conference which will be held Friday of next week in connection with the church gathering.

GARDEN CLUB PLANS THIRD FLOWER SHOW

Gresham Community and Garden club is planning for its early fall showing of flowers, which will be on display at the show room of Brockway & Nelson Saturday and Sunday during the daytime and evenings. This is the third show of the summer, one being held in June and one during the Multnomah county fair. AGED GRESHAM MAN DIES IN HOSPITAL

Theodore Dwight Lyman, 83, for the past 12 years a resident of Gresham, passed away at Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, Wednesday night, September 12. He had been a patient for five weeks at the hospital, where he twice went onto the operating table. He seemed to be making as good a recovery as could be expected for a man of his years, but pneumonia developed, which was the immediate cause of his death.

Mr. Lyman is survived by his widow and four children, eleven grandchildren and six great grandchildren. The children are A. R. Lyman, Miss Edith A. Lyman and Mrs. M. Ellen Horr, all of Gresham, and Mrs. Nellie T. Miller of Memphis, Tenn.

Kiwanis Club Being Formed in Gresham

The initial steps were taken at a meeting Wednesday evening toward forming a Kiwanis club in Gresham. Seventeen men signed up as favoring the club, which is half the minimum number required to make a club membership.

The plans and objects of Kiwanis were presented by members of Portland club which is sponsoring the local club. Among the speakers were, Art W. Stone, president Portland Kiwanis; Arthur A. Blanford, vice president; Harold C. Jones, secretary, and others.

Temporary officers of Gresham Kiwanis were selected as follows: C. I. Raker, president; Guy Fieldhouse, secretary, and C. E. Johnson, treasurer. Others have signed the roster since Wednesday night and there seems good prospect of completing the charter list within a few days.

Kiwanis is presented as a service club with an ideal of community upbuilding, working along helpful lines to give more permanency and effectiveness to every good movement in a community. Its work is carried on under guidance of a central organization, there being about 150,000 members in the United States and Canada, in about 1700 local clubs. Building an intelligent citizenship and promoting helpful understanding and friendly association are among the Kiwanian objectives. There is no distinction among members as to politics or creed and no oath is required.

This organization, if perfected, will help to make Gresham a better city and community.

NEAR EAST CHILDREN PERISHING OF FEVER

In a recent letter to J. J. Hand-saker, director of Near East Relief in the Pacific northwest, from C. C. Thurber, a heroic worker for the helpless children, he tells of the dire situation in Athens. He gives the following description:

"Over 200,000 are stricken with the dengue fever in Athens. There is a famine of ice, milk and lemons, the vital essentials to fight the plague. Almost every boy and girl in our Homes is a victim. My summer camp is a hospital, every bed filled, and dying boys and girls under the trees, but there is a breath of air there which you cannot find in Athens. I have had no real rest in ten days, nor had my clothes off except to bathe hastily in the sea. My house in Athens has no water. I have lost 20 pounds in weight, but long only for a cup of cold water. The government controls the ice supply and I can get only a little for my sick so dare not touch it for myself. Our personnel in warehouse and office are all stricken except three. Most of the shops, banks and business houses are closed. Miss Carr and three student nurses from Syria are doing heroic work all over the city. I have no stenographer left, but no words can paint the heart-rending picture of these thousands of sufferers. The aged are dying like flies, but thus far little mortality among the young. But if you could see their poor little half-starved, fever-wracked bodies burning up under this terrific heat—110 to 120 degrees Fahrenheit daily."
