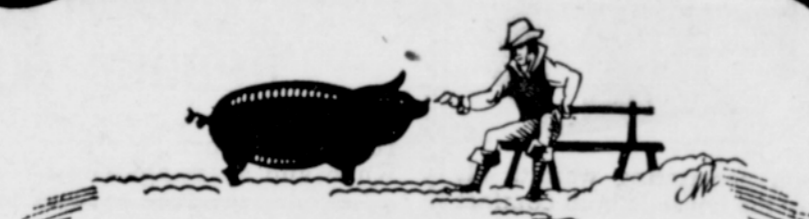
BRIDAL VEIL
