## Fine Program and Sports Feature Farmers' Field Day

Between 250 and 300 persons attended the Farmers' Field day, sponsored by the Multnomah Pomona and subordinate granges of the county at the Multnomah county fair grounds at Gresham Saturday.

During the forenoon a community sale was held at which Anton Malar Jr., auctioneer of Sandy, donated his services. Fifty or 60 articles consisting of implements, tools, household goods and vegetables were entered. Although there was not a large crowd of buyers present and bidding was somewhat slow, things sold at a fair price. However, some articles having reserve bids remained unsold. This is the first time such a sale has been undertaken by the granges of this county and it is hoped that since the possibilities have been demonstrated that a greater success can be made of the next one.

The basket dinner proved a popular event of the day's program, after which Samuel Lancaster, internationally known road engineer and "Father" of the Columbia River highway gave an illustrated lecture on "Highways." Beautiful colored pictures of highways in the United States and Europe were shown. Mr. Lancaster, who is a great lover of nature and God's great out-of-doors, takes much pleasure in showing his pictures, and his humorous remarks make the time fly rapidly by as one beautiful scene after another is shown. Many wild flowers were also shown and their habits described. Regarding the building of the Columbia River highway, Mr. Lancaster declared that friendly co-operation, between all classes, rich and poor alike, made the highway possible. He loves to think of the highway as a beautiful mosaic, where all classes of men gave their best to make a harmonious whole. He feels that every one connected with the work appreciated the fact that they were building a great highway in one of the most magnificent settings in the world.

Mr. Lancaster was indeed gratified to have the editor of one of the greatest dailies of New York City publish in his paper the following: "The people of the Oregon country have constructed the greatest highway in the most magnificent setting in the world. They have pierced the mountains through with cloistered tunnels and have carried the road around sheer precipices on buttressed walls being careful to preserve the natural beauty all about and not to mar the landscape as they looped the road among

great and stately trees and acres and acres of ferns."

Mr. Lancaster is now 64 years of age and he feels a great concern as to what the future generation will do towards preserving all this God-made beauty. He concluded by saying, "I am thankful to God for his goodness in permitting me to have a part in planning and constructing this great highway as a frame to the beautiful picture which he created in the Columbia gorge."

Other numbers on the program included the invocation by the Rev. A. E. Smith of Lents grange, selections by the "Jass Priests" orchestra of Russellville grange; reading, Elsie M. Christensen, and songs by Jacobson's quartet of Lents. Clay S. Morse, county commissioner, F. H. Crane, master of Multnomah Pomona grange, T. J. Kreuder and J. J. Johnson, masters respectively of Lents and Evening Star granges, also gave brief talks after which the sports took place.

In the crab race Delbert Exley won the first prize of \$1. In the wheelbarrow race, Delbert Exley and Elbert Weissenfuh won first, getting 50 cents each. The boys' bicycle race had many entrants, Roland Winters winning first prize, which was a sweater donated by the W. H. Markell company; Herman Green, second and Joe Scott, third. Each got 50 cents. In the "husband calling" contest for ladies, Mrs. Theo. Roy of Russellville won the only prize offered, a bean pot donated by the Lents Hardware company. The nail driving contest for ladies attracted much attention, Mrs. Blanch Stafford of Troutdale winning first, a vanity case donated by the Mount Scott Drug company, Mrs. J. Frank Schmidt of Fairview second, an order for 50 calling cards donated by the Mt. Scott Breeze and Mrs. L. D. Elliott of Portland, third, also an order for 50 calling cards donated by the Mt. Scott Breeze.

### LOCAL ELECTRICIAN GETS BIG CONTRACT

Arthur Bjur, of the Bjur Electric store of Gresham, began work yesterday morning with a crew of about a dozen men on the construction of a low resistance telephone line from the Western Broadcasting company's towers on Buckley avenue and East Glisan street, to Portland.

Mr. Bjur's part of the contract calls for ten miles of poles and wire from the towers of the company, known as KEX, to a connection with the Southern Pacific railroad where the tracks cross 82d street near Clackamas.

Programs will be received over this telephone line from Portland studios and broadcast from the towers.

The construction of this line will give the company an exclusive line of low resistance adding greatly to the clearness of messages.

The plans have been under consideration for some time and Mr. Bjur has just been informed that his bid was accepted and to proceed at once. The line is to be completed on or about October first.

The schedule is now practically complete for the season and includes games with Estacada, Milwaukie, Beaverton, Molalla and Park Rose. These schools have practically the same teams as last year and therefore will have a noticeable advantage.

With the graduation of Squire, Okuda, Wetzel and others, this year's team, while lighter, is showing good speed in practice. Coach Gowen is resorting to trick plays and deceptions rather than line plunges and straight football on which heavier teams usually depend.

About 30 men have reported for football and the outlook for the future team is more encouraging than any year in the past because much good freshman material is in evidence. It takes at least one year for the average high school boy to get into the game, it is said.

Coach Gowen is endeavoring to arrange games so that the second team will get some practice by playing an opposing school.

"The high school leaders appreciate the splendid support given them in the past by those who believe athletics should have sufficient funds to defray the cost of suits and equipment as well as pay the expense of getting other teams here and sending the local team to other schools," says Principal Cannon.

Lawrence G. Fulmer, aged 21 years, died early Sunday morning from a cardiac vascular renal disease from which he had been suffering for the past two years or more. ## Funeral Rites Held for Aged Resident

A company of sympathizing friends gathered Saturday morning at Gates Funeral Home with the family of the late T. D. Lyman, to do honor to the memory of one whom they had learned to love and respect. The services were in charge of the Rev. H. V. Wilhelm, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, of which the deceased was a member. Appropriate hymns were sung by a quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Walrad, Mrs. H. L. St. Clair and C. E. Rusher, with Miss Amy Cooper at the piano. The pall bearers were William Thom, W. J. Theodore Dwight Lyman was born in Vermont October 18, 1845, and departed this life in Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, Wednesday, September 12, 1928. The immediate cause of his death was pneumonia which developed during his weakness following two major operations. He had been in the hospital for more than five weeks with the best possible care under the supervision of his grandson, Dr. Harold Lyman, who had charge of the case.

As a young man Mr. Lyman moved to Wabasha county, Minnesota, where he married Miss Martha Bullock, March 28, 1868. They thus walked together in helpful, happy companionship for more than 60 years. Five children were born to them, four of whom with their mother survive. The children are Adelbert R. Lyman, Miss Edith A. Lyman and Mrs. M. Ellen Horst of Gresham and Mrs. Nellie T. Miller of Memphis, Tenn. There are also surviving 11 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Lyman came among the pioneer settlers of Redwood Falls, Minnesota, taking a homestead there soon after their marriage. Mr. Lyman was a faithful and consistent member of the Methodist Episcopal church since his young manhood. He was also a worker for temperance and a strong supporter of the prohibition movement from the time of its organization in 1869. Mr. Lyman and his family moved to Gresham in 1916 and have made a host of friends in this community.
