## County Council Has Full Program

Mrs. Chapman of the service shop spoke on the regional convention to be held in Portland October 30, 31 and November 1, and urged upon all the opportunity and privilege of attending the sessions and bringing back inspiration to the local circles.

Mr. Bush, a director in the Gilbert school, gave an interesting talk on some needed school legislation relating to the rights of franchise in rural districts. According to present regulations, he said, only those were entitled to vote on certain questions relating to the school, including bond issues, whose names appear on the most recent tax roll. Mr. Bush contended that this restriction was unfair to a large number of patrons who are bona fide residents of the district and home owners and builders, but who are paying for their homes and whose names do not appear on the tax rolls until the contracts are entirely paid out. As a result of this talk a committee was appointed to investigate the right of qualified voters on school matters and to report at the next meeting.

The resignation of Mrs. Sayles as president of the council was accepted with regrets and Mrs. C. W. Merritt of Parkrose was elected in her place. Mrs. William Faust of Russellville was elected second vice president.
