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HERBERT HOOVER, Man of the Hour.

"The boy is the father of the man," said a great philosopher. In Hoover's boyhood and in the decisions then made we have an index of what he now is.

All things are relative and in our evolution of his character, vision and leadership we must analyze and separate and individualize and properly relate cause and result. The searchlight must be focused upon inherited qualities, environment, trend of thought of the times, and particularly the moment of individual decisions.

Hoover's decisions are interesting and furnish a key to an understanding of his broad vision and efficiency. At the age of 11 he arrived at Newberg to establish a connection which might provide an education and a greater future. An orphan, separated from the scenes of his childhood without any immediate prospect of financial aid, it would not have been strange if he had settled down to an ordinary struggle for existence. Indeed, it would seem natural and entirely commendable had Hoover followed the wishes of his relatives to continue his education in a Quaker college and remain at Newberg.

In his determination to take a broader view of life and to speed up his career we get a good glimpse of the real Hoover spirit.

Imagine a young man projecting his vision forward into the great future and with dogged determination setting aside all opposition and obstacles. A great university in the last great west was coming into being—Hoover heard of the great men that were to be there, the broad training that was contemplated and it captivated his imagination. His education was not adequate for admission but with characteristic Hoover spirit he overcame all obstacles and was among the first group of students in Leland Stanford Jr. University.

In retrospect it would be easy to find a reasonable explanation for Hoover's eminently efficient career as we contemplate the contact with eminent men in the faculty and the successful student body of the early days of the university, but we must bring ourselves back to the decision made by Hoover when as a boy he looked forward into the future. What faith in himself and the future is here demonstrated. How inconsequential were the immediate obstacles. How clearly the importance of contact with great men is reflected. How clearly the spiritual conviction of service to humanity clarified his vision.

As if he were in the control of some unknown power, an orphan boy, he brushes aside every obstacle and quietly undertakes the task of preparing himself for a great future and to earn his way at the same time.

When Stanford decided to place his vast estate back of an institution as a memorial to his son he also decided that it should be outstandingly liberal and efficient. Traditional impediments were to be taboo. His objective was to speed up the efficiency and broaden the vision of its students. How well he fulfilled the thousands of able alumni are demonstrating daily in various professions and callings the world over. What an opportunity, say those who know of Stanford and its work, for Hoover to be there for four years,

graduating with its first regular class. What an opportunity to be a member of a university breaking away from traditional educational methods. How fortunate to be under the leadership of its great president of that day, David Starr Jordan. What an opportunity to be in the first classes of the great geologist Branner.

Let us turn to another scene. How fortunate that a boy of tender years in Salem, Oregon, made the first momentous decision to go to Stanford. How fortunate for Stanford that he made that decision and became a student there.

The Hoover spirit of attempting big things and carrying on to complete accomplishment them, is part of the Hoover spirit now. The Hoover then determined the Hoover now.

While a senior he met Miss Lou Henry whose family had moved from Iowa to Monterey, Calif. Miss Henry was inspired to take a course at Stanford by listening to a lecture given at Monterey by Professor Branner who was also the magic that attracted Hoover to Stanford. When the Chinese government wanted an American to head a new department of mines and railroads, Hoover was tendered the position which he accepted. He returned from Australia and married Miss Lou Henry.

Miss Henry was an Episcopalian but, as there was no protestant church in Monterey, the Rev. Ramon Moria Mastres of the Spanish Mission, having the rights of civil magistrate performed the ceremony at Miss Henry's home. They immediately sailed for China.
