Acceptance by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh of an invitation to be a distinguished guest at the American Legion national convention at San Antonio, October 8 to 12, has added greatly to the already keen interest in the convention.

A conference of executives of about 15 western automobile clubs was recently held in San Francisco and resulted in the organization of affiliated motor clubs to be known as the Western Motor club association.

The object is to provide a more complete reciprocal service between member clubs and to deal with the problems of motorists of the western territory. All the clubs are members of the A.A.A. and the Oregon State Motor club is included.

Political leaders of 20 years ago would have been speechless at the thought of a large share of presidential campaign activities in charge of women, but Lindbergh's flight to Paris would have affected them the same way. Less than two out of five voters in 1924 were women, but this year the women's vote may run up to 45 per cent of the total, according to many advance indications.

Herbert Hoover's campaign demonstrated popularity with the woman voter should be an important factor in getting that large a percentage of women to the polls.

Mr. Brandenburger, of the Oregon State Motor association says that speed trap artists and roadside courts have long been a cause of great inconvenience to America's motor touring army and the gradual elimination of those "blots along the highways" is a tribute to the services of organized motorists.

"Chief Justice Taft held that the fee system, which is the method used in the so-called 'ditch courts,' is not only a violation of the common law, but also is in direct conflict with the 14th amendment to the constitution, because it is not a trial by 'due process of law.'"

One of the leading democrats to endorse the Hoover-Curtis caucus has been former Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, author of the federal reserve act and of the farm loan act, who announced that he would support Mr. Hoover for president, because of the republican candidate's monumental record in preserving human life, during and after the war.

"Herbert Hoover, in my opinion, is the best qualified man ever presented by any party in America for the presidency during my lifetime," declared Senator Owen of Oklahoma.

State Senator Joe E. Dunne has become state supervisor of the Union Automobile club, an organization extending nationwide service and protection to motorists, it is announced at Portland headquarters of the club. Acceptance of the supervisors was made by Dunne after a license was issued upon approval of a \$26,000 bond filed with the state treasurer.

The benefits and protection offered by the Union Automobile club are of deep personal interest to every owner of a car, according to the senator, who is enthusiastic over the service. These features are planned for emergency mechanical needs, legal service, assistance for members' families, and other matters which involve a considerable cash saving for those carrying the club emblem. Dunne says he hopes to see the emblem of the Union Automobile club become as familiar a sight on Oregon roads as it is in other states.
