Mass Meeting Names Complete City Ticket

A goodly number of men and women of Gresham gathered at Metzger's hall Friday night for the mass meeting to nominate candidates for city offices to be chosen at the coming election. The candidates were chosen by popular vote and balloting was not necessary as not more than four were nominated for any one position. The line-up is as follows:

Mayor—Russel Akin, Charles Cleveland.

Treasurer—C. E. Johnson.

Recorder—C. G. Schneider.

Councilmen—Claude Stockton, Geo. Kenney, Roy Gibbs, B. W. Thorne, A. W. Botkin, Frank Hamlin and W. J. Todd.

City officers whose terms will expire the first of the year are Chas. Cleveland, mayor; J. H. Metzger, treasurer; C. G. Schneider, recorder; Russell Akin, A. W. Botkin and B. W. Thorne, councilmen.

Recorder Schneider called the meeting to order, after which Mayor Cleveland was chosen chairman. Schneider acted as secretary. It was announced that other candidates for the offices to be filled might be nominated by petition. Acceptance must be filed by the candidates with the recorder not later than Saturday, October 13.

This is the first time in the history of the city government that the marshal's office has not been elective. A charter amendment adopted two years ago goes into effect at this time which provides the marshal shall be appointed by the mayor with the approval of the council.

After the business was over informal discussion was given to some of the problems of the city. It was said that a new charter for Gresham, which is under consideration, would simplify many of the difficulties of administration and the enforcement of ordinances. The drafting of a building code will also be an advance step for the good of the city in the near future.

Mayor Cleveland expressed his appreciation of cooperation which has been given the administration and the hope that the next administration could have a workable charter. Economy has been the watchword, he said, and a conscientious effort has been made to conduct the city's business in a business like way. Constructive criticism is desired by the city officials, who want the people to state their needs.

Some criticism was offered in the meeting to the fact the marshal is kept busy hauling gravel and doing road work, thus preventing him from performing the usual duties of policing.

Councilman C. I. Raker spoke of

the cooperation of the citizens of Gresham with the officers of the town, and especially with the fire department. Business men are ready to back them in their endeavors to give good service, he said. People outside of Gresham are inclined to criticize the department for being unwilling to take the chemical outside the city to fight fires. What is needed, he said, is a new and better truck so that help could be given where needed and a truck still be kept in town. M. J. Allhouse said that was just what he had tried for months to bring about, that he would like to see the city own a good pumper and he believed the farmers around would be willing to help bear the expense if they could be sure of fire protection.

J. V. Cogswell brought a communication from the East Side Business Men's club of Portland asking the cooperation of Gresham in the matter of securing a broad highway from Burnside street to Gresham, connecting with the Mt. Hood loop, using the old right-of-way of the P. E. P. The possible abandonment in the near future of the Bull Run division by the railroad would simplify the problem, it was said.

COUNTY SCHOOL SUPT. ALDERSON ENDS LIFE

W. C. Alderson, county school superintendent of Multnomah county, committed suicide Monday morning at the grave of his daughter in the Lincoln Memorial cemetery, Portland. The death wound was inflicted by a bullet from a 22-calibre rifle.

Mr. Alderson, who was well and favorably known throughout the county, had served 12 years as county school superintendent and was the regular republican nominee for re-election this fall. He had been closely connected with educational affairs in the county for the past 30 years. He served 20 years as teacher and three years as superintendent in Portland schools before being elected to the position he held at the time of his death. In 1920-21 he was president of the Oregon State Teachers association and in July, 1925, he was elected vice president of the National Education association.

It is believed that Mr. Alderson was worrying over irregularities in the accounts of his office at the time of his death. He is survived by an aged mother, Mary Alderson, of Portland, with whom he made his home, two sons, a daughter, four sisters and a brother.

Mr. Alderson's death at this time raises the problem as to who will be nominated to fill his place on the regular ticket. The republican central committee will probably be called together soon, by the chairman, John L. Day, and a nomination be made to fill the vacancy.

AGED PIONEER DIES. NATIVE OF IRELAND

Mrs. Catherine Lynch died in Portland Friday, October 4, after being ill for nearly three months. She was born in Ireland February 1, 1846. Mrs. Lynch came to this country when 16 years of age and four years later came to Portland. On Thanksgiving day, 1874, she was united in marriage to Patrick Lynch at the Cathedral in Portland, which at that time was situated at Third and Stark streets. After their marriage they made their home on the farm on the Section Line road, where Mrs. Lynch has resided for the past 54 years. Mr. Lynch died nearly 13 years ago.

Mrs. Lynch is survived by two daughters and four sons, Mrs. Rose A. Moll, Mrs. Henrietta Lewis, John P., Herbert W., and Philip J. Also 10 grandchildren. Funeral services were held this morning at St. Joseph's church on the Powell Valley road. Burial was in Lincoln Memorial Park cemetery.

YANKS WIN SERIES FOUR STRAIGHT WINS

The New York Yanks made it four straight over the St. Louis Cardinals to win the world's series 4 games to 0. The Yanks on Tuesday pounded Sherdel for three homers, two by Ruth and one by Gehrig, for a 7 to 3 win. Waite Hoyt pitched the entire nine innings for New York. Sherdel lasted until the seventh. Ruth brought his batting average for the series well over the 600 mark, the highest ever made by a regular in a world's series.

School Cafeteria Nears Completion

The Gresham grade cafeteria that is being worked out by the Parent-Teacher association is expected to be ready soon after the 15th, to serve hot lunches to the school children.

The two west basement rooms that are to be used for the lunch room and kitchen are being remodeled to meet the necessary requirements, this week. A six-foot archway is to be made between the two rooms. In the kitchen there will be a built-in cupboard to extend almost the full length of the south wall, a range and a sink. In front of this a counter will be built and tables will fill the rest of the space in the one room and all of the space in the other.

The committee have been working earnestly for several months on the starting of this cafeteria and it is hoped that it will be a success. The school board voted in June to have placed in the budget \$500 to be used in the equipment necessary, and have later appropriated more, but the Parent-Teacher association, which is directly sponsoring the cafeteria will make it self-supporting when once started. This does not mean that there will be any unreasonable charges for the food served, only that the school board will not be liable for any further expenses. The association expect all members to help in putting this over and any material assistance will be appreciated.

On November 2, a hallowe'en circus will be given by the P.-T. A. at the grade school auditorium at 7:30 and the proceeds will be used to offset some of the expenses of the cafeteria and to furnish a rest-room for the teachers.

BETTER CITIZENSHIP IS COUNCIL'S AIM

At a recent meeting of the Americanization council, Charles A. Rice, superintendent of Portland schools, was elected president and Mrs. Saldie Orr-Dunbar was elected vice president. Mrs. Dunbar is well known in this part of the county, having taught in the Fairview school before her marriage. An enlarged program, including all of Multnomah county, which has just been added to the jurisdiction of the council by the state department of education, was adopted.

With the inclusion of all of Multnomah county in the council's territory the following organizations were added to the 100 that are already members: Multnomah county commission, Clay S. Morse; Multnomah school administration Superintendent W. C. Alderson; Multnomah County Pomona grange, Fred H. Crane. The campaign, already outlined, will seek 100 per cent citizenship standards in the county.

Work for the coming year, according to the secretary, H. J. Langoe, will be directed toward the 20,000 immigrant non-citizens in Portland, to which number 2000 are added annually.

In Portland, Secretary Langoe said, there are 3935 illiterates, unable to read or write any language.

DRAINAGE DISCUSSED BY NEARBY FARMERS

About 20 interested people were present at the drainage meeting at the Berry Growers Packing company office last evening. An instructive talk was given by S. B. Hall, county agent, on the purpose and benefits of drainage. It was estimated that tiling laid at the depth of approximately two and one-half feet would drain the surrounding berry fields. The digging of the ditch would cost about 50 cents a rod, and the tiling in proportion to the width of the pipes. In some localities perhaps it would be necessary to go deeper to strike the base clay on which the tile would be laid.

Kiwanis Luncheons Bubble With Cheer

Another elegant luncheon and all round good snappy time was had by the Kiwanians in the grange hall last night, 6:15 to 7:30, with Roy Cannon presiding.

The principal speaker last night was William H. Woodward of Portland who presented briefly but appealingly the needs of the "chest" drive to raise nearly \$700,000 for the various activities dependent on public contributions. Mr. Woodward told how necessary these various charities are, how carefully the funds are budgeted, how close a check is kept on the apportionment of the funds and how much better was this method of making contributions and rendering support than the old method of each soliciting for its needs throughout the year.

Mr. Woodward is one of Portland's best known and most active citizens and his talk was much appreciated. He was accompanied by his daughter, Miss Elizabeth.

While the Kiwanians lunch together the hour and a quarter is made intensive with snappy songs and short, practical talks, putting zest into the gathering and giving all a new grip on affairs personal and civic. The luncheons are being served by local church aid societies. The attendance is limited to members and invited guests or visiting members. There are at present about 40 members and the attendance has been nearly 100 per cent.

Secretary Ivan Swift sent out to the members last week a peppy letter in which he referred to the previous meeting, saying that 36 out of 39 members were present and he added:

"Boys, I want to assure you it's a pleasure to be secretary for a bunch that is on the job like you fellows are with everybody trying to find something more to do."

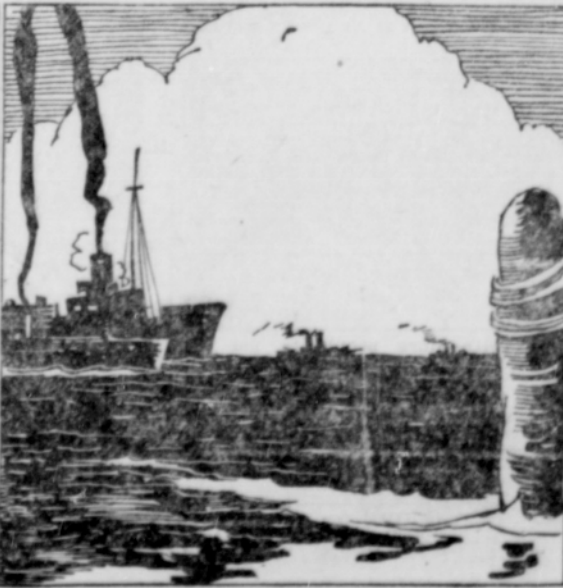
