OUTLOOK COMPLETES TOURIST GUIDE BOOK

The Pacific Highway Tourist Town Guide, with a run of 12,000 copies, has been completed at the Outlook office.

This guide book contains 112 pages of valuable information to the tourist. It is a competent guide of the Pacific highway and a business directory of towns or cities on the highway, from Vancouver, B. C., to Tijuana, Mexico. The book also mentions and locates the principal points of interest to the traveler adjacent to the highway covered, including extensive loops.

In compiling this book the publishers, the Tourist Town Map Co., of Portland, have kept in mind the needs of the traveler. They have spent many weeks in collecting the most important, suitable and necessary information for the tourist concerning the places on and near the Pacific highway.

The Outlook has spent a number of weeks working on the maps. Many instructive cuts and maps are featured in the book. An extra pressman was engaged for two weeks and the press was run day and night for almost that length of time. Five girls have been kept busy in the bindery department, for the past week and as the books are finished they are delivered to the publishers who distribute them among different advertisers in the towns and cities that are mentioned in the guide book.
