**STATE FORESTRY FAIR OF INTEREST TO OREGON**

An item of interest to Oregon forestry agencies was the first state forestry fair in the United States, that was put on by the state forestry department of Georgia, at Waycross, September 19-22. At the Georgia fair some 25 manufacturers of naval stores, wood-working equipments, and a number of timber companies had many different products on exhibit and gave demonstrations of the equipment used, and the forest products and their uses. Many other interesting features of the forestry work were shown.

The Oregon forestry agencies have been considering the possibility of a forestry building at the state fair grounds at Salem.
