## OBITUARY GIVEN OF JOHN DAVID TEEVIN

John David Teevin was born in Lindsay, Ontario, Canada, in 1856. He came to Portland in 1890 and two years later married Miss Catherine McGinley. Mr. Teevin was a roofing contractor for several years until his health failed, and then he purchased the farm near Gresham which has been the family home since 1900.

Mr. Teevin had recently undergone a major operation which impaired his health to such an extent that when he suffered a severe stroke of apoplexy, Sunday, October 13, he never regained consciousness before his death on Thursday evening, October 18. He was at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland at the time of his death.

The funeral was held from St. Mary's cathedral in Portland, October 22, with services by Rev. Father Chas. Keveny of Gresham. The interment was made in the Mt. Calvary cemetery.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Catherine Teevin, two sons, Wm. J. of Gresham, and Edmund P. of Oakland, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. J. S. Chiodo of Gresham and Mrs. M. L. Kleaver and two grandchildren, of Dunsmuir, Calif. Also a sister, Mrs. Margaret Sackett, of Sacramento, Calif., and a brother, James Teevin of Toronto, Canada.

## Judge Richard Deich Replies to Charges

Richard Deich, judge of the court of domestic relations, against whom a recall petition has been filed which will come up for a vote of the people at the coming election, has made a public statement for the consideration of the voters. Entirely aside from the merits of the case, the Outlook regrets the action which has culminated in this recall petition. Judge Deich's statement follows:

"I have refrained from answering the charges against me until the recall petitions were actually filed, but now that the matter is at issue I desire to make the following statement:  
"The charges upon which my recall as judge of the court of domestic relations is sought are grossly false, malicious and, I may add, insincere in every respect. The instigator of the charges, who is also sponsor of the recall, is inspired by revengeful and mercenary motives. My failure to appoint him chief probation officer of my court in the first instance and my refusal later to permit him to use my office and its records to further foster and financially benefit his personal and private ventures in Multnomah county, and not any sincere desire on my part to better the conditions of the wards of my court, is the true and underlying reason for his personal animus toward me and his pernicious activities in urging my recall.

"I have at all times been sincere in desire and faithful in effort to discharge my official duties in such a way as to meet the just expectations of the people of this city and county. My court has been kept clean in every respect and no scandal, financial or otherwise has attached to my administration or anyone connected therewith.

"Dependent children have in every instance been cared for as their best interests seemed to require. I am conscious of no wrong to nor neglect of any child brought before my court nor of any inhuman treatment of any parent, relative or friendly intervisor, man or woman, who has ever consulted me on official business or the care and best interests of delinquent or dependent children.

"I have at all times sympathetically co-operated with and solicited the co-operation of all social agencies, police and other public officers concerned in the welfare of children and have sought information, counsel and advice whenever and wherever obtainable as an aid in the performance of my official duties.

"I have at no time been vulgar or careless in speech or conduct or in the presence of girls, boys or women, either in my court room or elsewhere, or at all. I have always honestly and sincerely tried, and I believe have succeeded, in squaring my official and personal conduct with my profound respect for American womanhood and the Oregon boys and girls who have come within the purview of my official duties. I feel confident that my record for the last 30 years has acquainted the citizens of this county with my personal integrity and fitness for this office."
