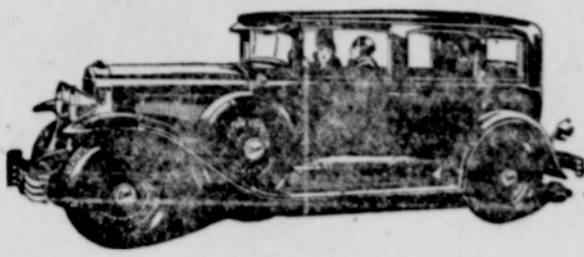


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Mrs. Eva B. Krebs Funeral at Sandy

Eva Brockman Krebs was born in Russia in 1875. She came to the United States with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Brockman, and settled with them in Wisconsin when she was four years old. She was later married to Charles Krebs and came west, living in or near Sandy for the past 25 years.

At 6:30 Thursday evening, during the supper hour, Mrs. Krebs suffered a severe pain in her arm. She was trying to gain relief by treatment of the arm when death occurred. Mrs. Krebs had done her ordinary work for the day and had had no premonition of the fatal stroke. Last February she underwent an operation and had not fully recovered, although she appeared to be in fairly good health at the time of her death.

Besides many friends and distant relatives Mrs. Krebs leaves her husband, 11 children, and three brothers to mourn her death. They are, respectively: Charles Krebs of Sandy, seven sons, Carl, Otto, Rudolph, Ernest, John, Ronald, and Werner, all of Sandy; four daughters, Mrs. Arthur Berglund, Eva and Hilda Krebs of Sandy, and Mrs. Mary Calopy, who lives in Washington. Three brothers are Charles Brockman of Independence, Ore., Fred Brockman and Emil Brockman of Sherwood, Ore.

Funeral services were first held at the home and later at the Saron Lutheran church at Sandy, with Rev. F. P. Schoen of Sandy, officiating. Interment was made in the Sandy cemetery under the direction of J. E. Metzger, funeral director.
