## Governor Proclaims Legion Week, 11-17

The week beginning with Armistice Day, November 11, has been designated American Legion week.

Governor Patterson has issued a call to the citizens of Oregon to assist the members and posts of the American Legion and Legion auxiliaries in preparing for the greatest year of service in the history of these organizations. The governor has issued a proclamation in which he calls attention to the effort that will be made during Legion week by the two organizations to recruit their numbers to full strength in order that work on the program for 1928 may be carried on with full and loyal support.

The proclamation declares the people of this state appreciate the work that is being carried on by these two service organizations and that the people are anxious that it shall be continued. The governor says:

"It was 10 years ago that this nation saw the birth of an organization that was destined to become one of the most outstanding patriotic forces that the world has ever known, an organization dedicated to the glorious service of 'God and country.' The American Legion was conceived by the men who honorably served their country in the World War and who desired to continue, in some manner, that same service in time of peace.

"The American Legion in the first decade of its history has by its great program of unselfish service to community, state and nation, well demonstrated to the people of America that it is a power for good. It has made provisions for the treatment and rehabilitation of those who were disabled in the great conflict, looked after the welfare of the children who were left fatherless in the wake of the war, exerted its every energy towards the promotion of the best interest of the nation and in the promulgation of those splendid principles of citizenship on which our nation was founded.

"Associated with the Legion in this great work is the American Legion Auxiliary, composed of the mothers, sisters, daughters and wives of Legionnaires. 'In numbers there is strength' and these two organizations have set aside one week, November 11 to 17, when every effort will be made to have paid up for 1928 the dues of all who are 1928 members, in order that the full strength of the Legion and auxiliary can thus early be put to work on the great objectives of the coming year."

## PRINCIPALSHIP HAS MANY APPLICATIONS

At a meeting of the school board Monday night the applications for the principalship of the Gresham Union high school, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Roy E. Cannon, republican nominee for county school superintendent, were considered and all but six of them rejected. Out of the six a principal will be chosen at a school board meeting in the immediate future, after thorough investigation has been made as to the qualifications of the applicants.

About 30 applications were received, coming from principals of different parts of Oregon, Idaho, Washington and California, and one from Montana. Most of the men who were applying for the position were men with the highest of recommendations.

All the Japanese in Gresham and vicinity are expected to take part, dressed in various costumes. An effort was made to obtain a band for the occasion but without success. There will be music, however, by various instruments and drums.

## P.-T. A. CIRCUS WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL

About 600 people crowded the auditorium at the grade school Friday evening, and were highly entertained by the Parent-Teachers circus that was being staged. Booths had been temporarily arranged around the walls of the room, containing a number of different sideshows and circus attractions. At different times during the evening a number of special features were given.

All the eatables and fancy souvenirs that were for sale were sold long before the program was over. The chairman of the finance committee reports that the proceeds totaled over \$110, and of this amount, about \$100 was clear. On account of the splendid cooperation of the Gresham people, who donated a number of articles, and also much of their time, not much expense was entailed in putting on the circus. The money will be used as an addition to the funds to be used in the management of the cafeteria in the grade school.

At the meeting of the Gresham grade P.-T. A. Monday afternoon reports of the finance committee and the committee that has had the organization of the cafeteria work were given and the results seemed quite encouraging. Mrs. Pearl Mack, who has been doing the cooking, alternately assisted by one of the mothers of youngsters in the grades, has been serving on the average of 110 hot dishes and 58 desserts daily since the opening of the cafeteria. It is hoped that in the near future, when the cafeteria is more established, that a paid helper may be employed to assist Mrs. Mack, but that at the present time the committee asks that one woman a day be solicited to assist with the preparation of the lunches.

In addition to the business hour of the afternoon an entertaining feature was given in the form of two vocal solos by Miss Alice Leekly, accompanied by Miss Florence Honey at the piano.

### BORING YOUTH TO BE TRIED FOR MURDER

Earl Jones, 19-year-old youth of Boring, will go on trial in the circuit court at Oregon City, November 22, on a charge of first degree murder. The home of Robert Jones, father of the accused youth, was dynamited last March and Mrs. Jones and a young son were killed. Earl, suspected of the crime, was arrested and later indicted by the grand jury for murder.

The case has been delayed, awaiting the recovery of the father, who was seriously injured by the explosion.
