

Cities Retain Mayors; Also New Councilmen

Charles Cleveland, who has served two terms as mayor of Gresham, was victorious in the city election held Tuesday in conjunction with the national and state elections. Russell K. Akin gave Mr. Cleveland some keen competition, receiving 283 votes to Cleveland's 351. Another closely contested office was that of city treasurer. C. E. Johnson, cashier of the Bank of Gresham, received 308 votes, with C. J. Lundquist, cashier of the First State Bank, receiving 319. This elected Lundquist as city treasurer by a small margin of 11 votes.

C. G. Schneider, only contestant for recorder, received the popular vote of 571. Favoritism seemed to be scattered in the choice of the councilmen. Of the six men from which three councilmen were to be selected, all received a good number of votes. Roy H. Gibbs, with 513 votes, Dr. A. W. Botkin, with 328 and B. W. Thorne with 323 were the three to receive the election. W. J. Todd was a close fourth with 289 votes, Frank Hamlin and C. E. Stockton received 273 and 200 votes, respectively.

Troutdale Re-elects Woman Mayor.

Two hundred and sixty-two ballots were cast in the city election held at Troutdale on November 6, making the largest number of people to enter the polls in that precinct for some time. Laura D. Harlow, first woman mayor in the state of Oregon, was re-elected for her third term. H. E. Bloyd, present recorder and Isabelle Waite, present city treasurer, were both re-elected. The only competition to enter the election at Troutdale was shown in the votes cast for marshal. The popular vote was divided between J. F. Coons and W. J. Crawford, with the majority going to the former. W. L. Richardson was elected to hold office as a councilman for a two-year term. Francis May Fox, Ida Crawford, and L. G. Howell were chosen for councilmen with four-year terms.

Fairview Voting Heavy.

In the Fairview precinct over 200 ballots were cast in the city and national election. The city election resulted in the re-election of E. E. Heslin for mayor, G. P. Lumsden for recorder and John Moller for treasurer. Councilman for four-year terms, elected that day, are W. D. Brooks, J. I. Mahaffey and George Shaw. John Peterson, who was running for councilman for two-year term was unanimously elected.

HERBERT C. HOOVER

Herbert Clark Hoover, of California, republican, was elected Tuesday to the presidency of the United States in one of the most remarkable elections ever held in this country.

The election was overwhelming in his favor, giving him about five million popular plurality and 444 electoral votes to his opponent's 87. Thus Hoover will get more electoral votes than given any previous president. Wilson in 1912 received 435 and Harding in 1920 received 404.

In his election other precedents have been broken.

Hoover is the first man from west of the Mississippi to be elected to the presidency. He is said to be the second engineer to be elected, Washington being the first, and he has never held or sought an elective political office before.

American Legion Week Is Named by Mayor Cleveland for Nov. 11-17

A proclamation officially designating the week beginning on Armistice Day as American Legion Week and calling on all citizens to aid the Legion in its big membership effort that will be conducted during the week, was issued today by Mayor Chas. Cleveland.

The proclamation praised the Legion for its high ideals and splendid objectives for the coming year and urged that full cooperation be given the Legion in making this week one of the most successful in the history of the organization.

According to A. E. Jonsrud, commander of Gresham Post No. 30 of the Legion, this week is a part of a nation-wide observance when the public in general will give its support to the efforts of the Legion to start out on its 1929 program with a 100 per cent membership by enrolling all who are members in 1928. Every person who is eligible to membership in either the Legion or Legion Auxiliary, will be asked to enroll during this week.

A Proclamation.
The people of the city of Gresham.

I am have the greatest admiration for the splendid service given by her sons and daughters in time of war. They appreciate the heroic sacrifices that have been made by the loyal men and women who have so ably defended this great nation of ours in every emergency.

Today we have in this city an organization composed of those who only a decade ago were engaged in that most glorious service. They served their country well and when the war was over they banded themselves into the American Legion, determined to continue the same service they gave overseas. They dedicated their organization to "God and Country" and immediately began that work which has identified the American Legion as one of the greatest patriotic forces America has ever known.

One of the first tasks of the Legion was to make provision for the relief and rehabilitation of those who were disabled. They looked after the welfare of the children who were left orphans by the war. Then they launched a great program of unselfish service to community, state and nation. Many activities were undertaken by the Legion in an effort to serve the people and the country.

This year the Legion and the Legion Auxiliary which is associated with the Legion in its work, is anxious that the 1929 program be started as soon as possible. In order that the full strength of the two organizations can thus early be put to work on the great objectives of the coming year, the week of November 11 to 17 has been set aside when every effort will be made by the Legion and the Auxiliary to have paid up for 1929 the dues of all who are 1928 members.

The citizens of Gresham are justly appreciative of this peace time service of the Legion and they are willing to contribute their efforts to the success of the Legion program. It is appropriate and fitting that the people of this city should pledge full cooperation to the Legion and Legion Auxiliary in its membership program.

Now, therefore, I, Chas. Cleveland, mayor of the city of Gresham, proclaim the week beginning November 11 and ending November 17, as American Legion Week and urge every citizen to encourage and aid the Legion in enrolling members for the coming year. Every World War veteran, particularly he who has not heretofore belonged to the Legion, should take this opportunity of becoming associated in the great work.

RESPECTED CITIZEN LAID TO LAST REST

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Methodist church in Gresham for Schuyler C. Jones, who passed away at his home west of Gresham Monday after nearly nine months of illness, a large part of which time was spent in a Portland hospital, and during all of which time he endured intense suffering. The services were unusually impressive. The sermon was by Rev. H. V. Wilhelm, who gave an inspiring message of comfort and hope. Rev. Oliver Gill of Pleasant Home, for several months a fellow worker with Mr. Jones for the A. W. Metzger company, read the scripture and later spoke briefly of his friendship for Mr. Jones and his appreciation of the sterling character of the man. David M. Cathey, brother-in-law of the deceased and for many years his close neighbor, paid a tribute to his memory and told of his last few months of triumphant faith in God. A profusion of flowers attested the regard for the departed and sympathy for the surviving members of his family.

Music was furnished by a mixed quartet and accompanist from Portland brought by the Jacobson company having the funeral arrangements in charge.

The pallbearers were H. L. Camp, Chas. Kadderley of Portland, John Sleret, B. W. Thorne, Dr. H. H. Ott and C. J. Lundquist of Gresham.

Interment was in the Gresham cemetery.

In his remarks Mr. Cathey said that while Mr. Jones had never made public profession of religion or joined any church, yet he had always been a believer in God, and after his operation several months ago he gave clear evidence of having made his peace with God and was happy in the knowledge of his acceptance. He said that Mr. Jones had an insight into the future which made him unexpectably happy during his last weeks. He was conscious almost to the end and longed to go home. He was a good citizen, a good neighbor, a loving and indulgent husband and father.

Mr. Jones was born in Osawkee, Kan., May 10, 1866. He came to Oregon with his mother in 1885, soon after went to Montana where he spent a year and then returned to this vicinity where he has made his home on his farm with the exception of about six years when he lived in Gresham. On April 9, 1890, Mr. Jones married Elizabeth Ann Cathey who, with their four children, survives him. The children are Jackson F. Jones, Mrs. Echo Akin and Hal Jones of Gresham and Guy D. Jones of Portland. There are four grandchildren.

Winning Candidates Well Supported Here

A strong republican vote in the national and state election Tuesday was shown throughout the three precincts of Gresham by the results that came from the approximately 1000 ballots that were cast, it being the heaviest vote ever polled here. Herbert Hoover, on the republican ticket for president of the United States, carried Gresham with 651 votes against the 203 of his democratic opponent, Alfred E. Smith.

Franklin F. Korell, representative for congress from the third district, was another favored republican of the voters of Gresham. Mr. Korell was given 600 votes to the closest opponent, W. C. Culbertson. Hal E. Hoss, running for secretary of state received 635 votes and Thos. B. Kay, candidate for state treasurer received 563. John L. Rand, of Baker county and Geo. Rossman, of Multnomah county, both republicans, running for justices of the supreme court, were both favored by the majority of the votes of Gresham voters, Mr. Rand receiving 426 votes and Mr. Rossman, 603.

Other republicans to receive the greater number of votes over their respective contestants were I. H. Van Winkle for attorney general and John D. Mickle, for dairy and food commissioner. For judges in the circuit court in the fourth judicial district the following men received the majority of votes: Jacob Kanzler, for Dept. No. 1; Robert Tucker, for Dept. No. 3; Louis P. Hewitt, for department No. 5; Walter H. Evans, for Dept. No. 6; and George Tazwell, for Dept. No. 7.

The five men to be chosen for state senators from the 13th senatorial district who received the majority of votes from the local precincts were J. O. Bailey, J. E. Bennett, Harry L. Corbett, Gus C. Moser and Isaac E. Staples. For representatives from the 18th representative district, Gust Anderson, Homer D. Angell, Earl C. Bronaugh Jr., Allan A. Bynon, Barnett H. Goldstein, Wilber Henderson, K. K. Kubli, Dorothy McCullough Lee, Frank J. Loneragan, Neil Malarkey, John B. McCourt, A. G. Rushlight, and Harvey Wells, were given the majority of votes. For representatives for the 30th district which includes Multnomah and Clackamas counties, Frank E. Andrews was endorsed by the Gresham voters.

In the votes cast for the candidates for county offices the majority was decidedly republican. For county commissioner Fred W. German received 540 votes to his nearest competitor's 156. Thomas M. Hurlburt, present county sheriff, was favored by 580 votes of Gresham for re-election. A. A. Bailey received 577 votes for county clerk, John M. Lewis, 604 for county treasurer and Hiram U. Welch, 661 for county assessor.

Roy E. Cannon of Gresham, only candidate for county school superintendent was well supported by the Gresham people. Mr. Cannon received a total of 711 votes, which was the largest number of votes cast for any one candidate in the entire election, by the local voters. Other candidates for county offices who were favored in the Gresham precincts were Robert C. Bonser, for county surveyor; Dr. Earl Smith, for county coroner; George W. Hoyt for clerk of the district court and M. M. Squire for constable for the Multnomah district.

Four hundred and thirty-six men and women who cast their ballots in the local precincts Tuesday voted for the recall of Richard Deich, judge of the court of domestic relations of Multnomah county, while 342 opposed such recall.

The bills and amendments to the state constitution aroused keen competition among the voters with only two carrying. The Grange Income Tax bill was carried with only a small majority of 26 votes. The amendment to the constitution in the form of the Limiting Power of Legislature over Laws Approved by the People amendment was also successful but with only a small margin of 18 votes. The Five-Cent Gasoline Tax bill was badly defeated and also the bill for Reduction of Motor Vehicle License Fee. The four River Water and Fish bills were defeated by approximately 100 votes in each case.
