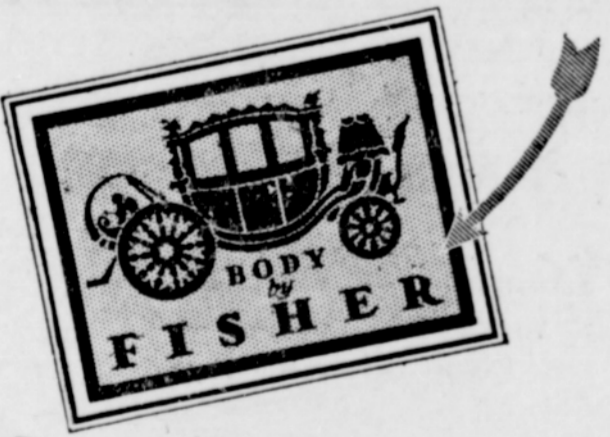

The boys judged two classes each of dairy and beef cattle, sheep and hogs. Forty teams competed in the judging and represented Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Washington and Oregon.

Jean Inglis and Charlotte Johnson of Gresham, judged cooking, canning and sewing, placing sixth with 1295 points. The girls competed with teams from Washington, Idaho, Nevada and Oregon.

Gerald Emily and Kenneth Bramhall of Corbett placed fifth in the potato judging contest. Gerald Emily won first on potatoes. In the 4-H boys' and girls' livestock section Floyd Stafford of Troutdale was awarded the plaque offered by the American Guernsey Cattle club for the champion female Guernsey. Great interest and excitement was in the air last night at the exposition when the 400 4-H club members, attending the exposition from five western states held their livestock parade in the horse show arena before a large crowd. Trophies and awards were presented at this time. The Plummer trophy, the most important general award, went to the Utah delegation. O. M. Plummer, general manager of the show, was made a present of a fine new sedan car as a token of the esteem in which he is held by the boys' and girls' club members and their leaders. 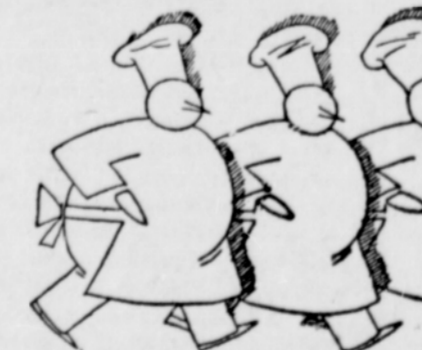
TROUTDALE
