INDUSTRIAL NOTES FROL ALL OREGON

Sutherland-R. M. Fox of Roach Timber Co. says railroad work starts. Heppner-Ground broken for erection of a cheese factory here. Independence securing a sugar factory with a large acreage of beets. Brookings wharf being built to give vessels 25 feet of water. Canby building a bungalow house for the United Artisans. St. Johns Lumber Co. will build dock 100 by 250 feet. North Bend to have two more factories employing 150 additional men. Haines opens modern cheese factory this week. La Grande and O. W. R. & N. agree on \$22,000 overhead viaduct. Oregon banks gain in resources over a year ago \$38,563,440. Warrenton drain tile, hollow tile and sewer pipe plant starts April 7. Salem Presbyterians will erect large Sunday school room. Madras-Jefferson county to get a substantial brick county building. Linen manufacturer from New York in Oregon to locate a factory. Portland-First big steel ship built in Portland yard launched Saturday. Astoria-200,000 tons more rock will complete north jetty by June 1. Elmira saw mill resumes operation with 40 hands. Portland-F. J. Cobb to build \$100,000 heights residence. Estacada to get saw mill, P. R. L. & P. Co. to furnish site. Beaverton will supply 900,000 bricks for Portland postoffice. Albany has new daily newspaper, the Morning Republican. Sumner-Smith-Powers Logging Co. opens camp here. Government planning to build 1000 new ships, many of which will be constructed at Pacific coast shipyards. Portland-March 31 first large steel freighter was launched. St. Helens lumber shipments for the past week were nearly four millions.

Shipyards here will build ships for the government, also flour mill. Coos Bay-Bay Park mill is being improved to cut 100,000 a day. Bandon-Local shipyard may get contracts. Prineville-\$53,000 railroad contract. To start at once with all local labor. Prineville-Shipment of local jack-rabbit skins bring 14 cents each. Dallas plans first unit of strictly modern fireproof, reinforced concrete hospital to accommodate 150 patients. Salem-Business of 177 state and 82 national banks greatly increased last year, according to showing arrived at by Bank Superintendent Sargent. Both deposits and loans increased.

FORMER RECORDS ARE ALL BROKEN

During March there were billed out from the Hermiston station of the O. W. R. & N. Co. 75 fully loaded cars. Never before in the history of the Hermiston country was this record equalled. In addition to these 75 loaded cars there was the less than car lot shipments sent out and the freight also received. In the early days heavy shipments were received while construction work was in progress and the government was bringing in great quantities of material. Even then no such record as this was made. The best of it, however, is the fact that every pound of these shipments brought money into the Hermiston country.
