these, together with the glass containing the indicator in the same warm place and let rise until the indicator shows it has just doubled in volume. Then place the loaves in the oven, which should be at a good steady heat (400 to 425 F) and bake 45 to 50 minutes.

Wheat and corn bread No. 2 (same proportions as No. 1 except the liquid):  
Put 2-3 cupfuls; 3-4 pound, of corn meal into a double boiler or a vessel which can be placed over another one containing boiling water. Add to the meal 3/4 cupful of cold water; mix thoroughly and bring to the boiling point, stirring frequently. Allow the meal to steam for at least 10 minutes, then cool it until lukewarm. To this scalded and cooled meal add the salt, sugar, 1 cupful of flour, and the yeast rubbed smooth and mixed with 2 cupfuls of lukewarm water. Mix thoroughly, cover, and set in a moderately warm place to rise as directed in method No. 1. When this batter or sponge has become very light, which will require about two hours, beat it thoroughly add the softened shortening, if it is to be used, and the remainder of the white flour, two pounds or quarts. Knead thoroughly until it is smooth and elastic. Should the dough be either too stiff or too soft add water or flour, a little at a time, working it in thoroughly until the dough is of the proper consistency. Cover and set back in its warm place to rise until double in bulk. Then mold into loaves and finish as directed under method No. 1.

### The Flag

There are some rules about the flag which should be remembered. The flag should be raised at sunrise, or after, never before. The flag must be lowered at sunset. It is a mark of disrespect to fly the flag through the night.

When the flag is hung against a wall the blue field should be in the upper left hand corner if the stripes are horizontal, or in the upper right hand corner if the stripes are perpendicular. A flag used as a street banner should be hung across the street at an equal distance between curbs.

United States laws forbid the use of the flag in registered trademarks or for advertising purposes. In no case should the flag be allowed to touch the ground. A flag reversed, with the blue field down, is a sign of distress.

## GOOD ROAD POINTERS

Good roads will make Oregon the greatest dairying center in the world. Remember this when you vote on the road bond bill in June.

The proposed bond issue will provide good roads at no greater cost than the state is now paying for poor ones.

The action of the recent Legislature in doubling the annual license on automobiles and making the funds derived therefrom available for road construction is justified by the reasoning that it is the automobile that destroys the road and it should bear the burden of road construction.

"When public money is honestly spent on a road every dollar becomes three dollars," says the Portland Journal. "First, there is the dollar in the road itself. Second, there remains in the community the dollar which has been paid out for labor and material. Third, there is the dollar of economic value added to the land adjacent to the road. This is a real value, not a speculative one. It is an increase in productive capacity."

Better reasons for supporting the road bond bill June 4th could not be offered. It may be depended upon that Highway Commissioners Benson, Thompson and Adams will see to it that every dollar of the road fund is honestly expended and full value returned in roads honestly constructed.

The personnel of the Highway Commission, appointed by Governor Withcombe, is in itself a guarantee that the money derived from the proposed \$6,000,000 good roads bond issue will be wisely and economically expended. It is a further guarantee that every cent of the money will be spent in practical road construction. There will be neither waste nor extravagance in the expenditure of the fund.
