PRESIDENT HEADS NEW ARMY PARADE

First Increment of Selective Draft Leaves for Camps.

MANY MARCH AWAY

Members of House and Senate Join Ranks of Soldiers to Pay Honor to Departing Young Army.

Washington, D. C. — The President and congress of the United States and the allied nations, through their diplomatic representatives, joined Tuesday in paying honor to the men selected from the District of Columbia for service in America's National Army raised for the battle for democracy.

Washington, long used to glittering processions, opened its eyes and cheered itself hoarse at the spectacle. For two hours, while in other cities throughout the Nation other thousands moved over the first part of the long road that may lead to French battlefields, Pennsylvania avenue heard the tramp of marching men, the jingle of spurs and the rattle of artillery.

MAYOR IS HUNG IN EFFIGY

Council Votes Praise to Gov. Lowden for Refusing Pacifist Meeting.

Chicago — Chicago's City council, sitting as a committee of the whole, at the end of a turbulent four-hour session Wednesday, adopted by a vote of 42 to 6 a resolution praising Governor Frank O. Lowden for his action in overriding Mayor William Hale Thompson by refusing permission to the People's Council for Democracy and Peace Terms to meet in Illinois and urging the state's chief executive to prevent any meeting in the future which may be inimical to the public safety or disloyal or treasonable to the United States.

Rich Man's Son is Loser. Salt Lake City — George Low Abbott, son of a wealthy Ogden manufacturer, who was ordered to report for military service, but who successfully claimed exemption, will have to go to war, after all. Abbott claimed exemption because he said his wife was dependent upon him.

Peace Answer Discussed. Amsterdam — Baron von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary, who is on a visit to Vienna, discussed Wednesday with Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, the terms of the reply of the central powers to the pope. The emperor received both ministers and heard their proposals regarding the answer. Baron von Kuehlmann is expected to return to Berlin at once and will proceed immediately to headquarters to report to the kaiser.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

An entire carload of pigs raised by schoolboys, members of industrial clubs in Umatilla county, will be sent to Salem this month to compete in the State fair.

Earnest J. Bauer has notified the Oregon City board that he will appeal his claim for exemption to the President after having been turned down by the appeal board in Portland for alleged fraudulent affidavits.

Coroner Clough of Salem received a report Monday that J. M. Massey, 47 years old, was discovered dead, hanging in the barn at his home near Broadacres, about 22 miles north of Salem. No reason was given for the suicide.

F. J. Canfield delivered 85 head of hogs to George Zimmerman at Carlton Monday, for which he received a total of \$2035, the average weight being 179 pounds. All were Mr. Canfield's own, and were raised on clover and rape and finished with grain.

W. R. Osborn, of Amity, completed arrangements to install a five-ton-per-day canning plant at Toledo to handle the evergreen blackberry crop for this season. He has leased the Port of Toledo's warehouse for six months, and next year will build a cannery and process both fruits and vegetables.

Coos Bay will entertain United States officials who are directing contracts for aeroplane stock. There are six mills in the county putting out spruce lumber for airplanes and foreign government inspectors have visited there frequently to inspect the output.

Prominent ranchers from the Upper Deschutes section conferred Tuesday with District Attorney Dearmond and Sheriff Roberts at Bend, as to the best means of ending stock rustling, which is reported on the increase in their section. The results of the meeting were not made public, it being desired to give no warning to the cattle thieves.

Two men were killed and two others sent to a hospital as the result of a motor truck plunging from the Pacific Highway grade on top of the Siskiyou near Ashland late Sunday night. The dead are Jack Robinson, of Portland, and McDonald, whose given name and address were not ascertained. The men in the hospital are Greek laborers. All were employed in a grading camp on the highway, of which Robinson was foreman.

Practically all the hay in the west end of Umatilla county is sold, according to reports. Much of it went at \$16.50 a ton in the stack, regardless, in many instances, of quality.

Dr. L. F. Straight, of Eugene, is the owner of a hen that lays eggs weighing four ounces each. Dr. Straight states that an egg is produced every other day and that all are of uniform size. The hen is of the barred Plymouth rock variety.

The Siletz Indian fair began Thursday and lasted three days. It was wholly an Indian fair, and the exhibits consisted of grain, fruit, vegetables and Indian craft work. The Siletz Indian band of 25 pieces was a feature of the fair. Feather dances were given, in which much of the old tribal life was depicted.

Every woolen mill in Oregon is now working on government orders, says State Treasurer Kay, who conducts a woolen mill in Salem. Practically every one of them is working night and day. Mr. Kay has just announced that on September 1 the employees in his mill will receive another substantial increase in pay.

Miss Beatrice Webb, who has taught in the Grants Pass schools for the past four years, left this week for San Francisco to sail for Hawaii. She will teach at Piau, on the island of Maui.

Determined to catch Jan W. Hasing, Portland wife-murderer who recently escaped from the penitentiary, newspapers and other mediums will be plastered with advertisements and descriptions of the escaped convict. This was announced at the penitentiary Friday.

The importance of the cranberry industry to the Astoria section is recognized this season more than ever before. While the picking of the crop is still a week or two distant, the growers have made preparations on a larger scale than last year.

Jefferson Tester, Delbert Parks and Elmer Hamblet were arrested in Roseburg recently charged with violating the cigarette ordinance of that city. Parks was fined \$10, Hamblet \$5 and Tester was sentenced to wheel eight tiers of wood from the street into the city hall.
