Summons

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit in said court within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons and on or before the 29th day of October, 1917, and you are further notified that if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead in this cause within said time, the plaintiff for want thereof will apply to the above entitled court for the relief prayed for in his complaint herein, to-wit: for judgment against the defendant, J. E. Keefe Jr., for the sum of \$463.05 with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from March 2, 1917, until paid, and for the further sum of \$5.00 for extension of abstract and for the further sum of \$100.00 attorneys' fees, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements of this suit; and for a further decree declaring the mortgage described in plaintiff's complaint herein upon the N¹/₄ of NE¹/₄ of section 2, Tp. 3 N. R. 29 E. W.
