### CITY IRRIGATION WATER ASSESSMENT FOR 1918

Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with Ordinance No. 96 of the City of Hermiston, an assessment has been levied upon and against the following lots and parcels of land in the irrigation district heretofore established in the City of Hermiston in the amounts set forth below.

The total amount of assessment in said irrigation district is \$429.00.  
The contract price to be paid for water for irrigation in said district is \$105.00.  
The cost of operation and maintenance of said irrigation district is established at \$429.00.

The City Council will sit as a board of equalization at 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, June 19, 1918, and will at said time examine the assessment roll and correct all errors therein. Any person feeling himself or herself aggrieved by such assessment may apply to the City Council when that body sits as a board of equalization and an opportunity will be given them to have the assessment changed, in the opinion of the City Council, such changes are just.
