**AMERICAN TROOPS
 CAPTURE RAILWAY**

With the American Armies in France.—The American troops advanced their line a third of a mile on a front of a mile and a quarter immediately east of Fismes, driving the Germans from the railroad and capturing what has been an advantageous position.

The boche had dug in along the railroad skirting the south bank of the Vesle and had established numerous machine gun nests. The Americans were in a dip south of the main Soissons-Rheims highway. They had to advance across open country toward the railway.

A stiff barrage was put down on the railway at 5 a. m., the infantry starting their advance simultaneously. Quickly they topped the highway and charged across the open space in the face of a terrific machine gun fire. The attack was so impetuous it sent the boche running. A heavy enemy barrage was put down on the railway, but the Americans held on.

BRIEF NEWS OF THE WAR

Notwithstanding strong German reinforcements on both wings of the battlefront, the British and French forces everywhere have beaten off the enemy and continued the victorious progress.

The enemy has lost wide stretches of ground, numerous towns, and thousands of men made prisoner and large quantities of materials and guns. The Germans are launching strong counter attacks against the French between the Oise and Allette rivers in an endeavor to hold back General Mangin's army which is threatening the entire German front in this region.

With all this fierce fighting and notwithstanding the fact that the British at many places have fought over open ground against an enemy protected in "pot holes" and strong points of other kinds, the British losses everywhere seem to have been extraordinarily light. This probably is due to the confusion the Germans find reigning behind their lines, as they are fighting a losing battle, which for them hourly grows most disastrous.

In the Vpsages regions the Americans are keeping up their patrol activity against the enemy. The Americans have bombed German points behind the line. Thirty-eight bombs were dropped from airplanes on Conflans Saturday and ten direct hits were scored. Considerable fighting in the air also is taking place. Austro-Hungarian reinforcements have arrived on the southeastern end of the western front, a number of soldiers from Austrian units having been captured by French patrols in the Woivre region.

Germany Protests to Spain. Amsterdam.—Germany has energetically protested against the intention of Spain to replace sunken Spanish tonnage by interned German ships, according to an official statement issued in Berlin.

American Casualty List is 23,574. Washington.—American casualties in the great war announced by the war department to date total 23,574, of which 20,673 were in the army and 2,901 in the marine. There were 2,493 casualties reported the past week.

260,000 German Men Unnaturalized. Washington.—About 260,000 unnaturalized male Germans live in the United States and have registered under enemy alien regulations, the department of justice reported.
