## MANY LAND SALES MADE

Land selling during the last 30 days has taken on some of the old time boom liveliness and except for inflated values one might think history had already commenced to repeat itself on Umatilla project.

The sales have been on a sound basis of income values and are consistent with the safe and sound development of the project.

B. W. Smith has sold his 30 acres northwest of town to McClintock of Madras.

Ben Savage has sold his place near the Umatilla Butte to W. D. Gordon of Butter Creek and has given possession.

The Cato Johns ten acre tract north of town has been sold to Mr. Monroe of Madras who is now on the way here.

The Umatilla Farm Lands Co. sold 36 acres in the Fourth unit, unimproved, to John Nelson and P. T. Duncan, of Alderdale, Wash. Each bought 18 acres and will commence to improve this fall.

A. W. and F. J. Prann sold their 20 acres of alfalfa southwest of town to Mr. Gould of Madras who will build and move on soon.

E. A. Hobbs' place has been sold to Chas. White of Culver who will take possession November 1st.

What is known as the Webster 20 acres southwest of town has been sold to John Fox of Jefferson county, who will be here soon.

The Umatilla Farm Lands Company has sold 665 acres in several tracts to L. C. Hammer of Dundee, who will move here at once. About 100 acres of this is now under water and the balance of future units.

D. H. McKinley of Lents, Ore., has also bought 135 acres of the Umatilla Farm Lands Company near town and has commenced improving the same.

The Mrs. Locke place on South Hill has been sold to a Heppner man, but possession has not yet been given.

George A. Gill of Klickitat county, Wash., has bought 20 acres near the Erie-Oregon orchard and will commence to improve at once.

Dodd & Knapp, who made most of the above sales, report that a number of others are pending, some large cash deals. The tendency of the prices is upward, but the buyers are cautious and want chiefly well improved land. They are nearly all farmers and good judges of land, and unimproved land or neglected or half improved properties do not appeal to the class that is looking for homes now. The advice of the land salesmen is to put farms in good condition and have a neat appearance to the premises if a good price is expected.

## DAIRY SHOW WILL BE BEST EVER HELD

The Hermiston Dairy and Hog Show will be the biggest and best this year; bigger and better than any of the five former shows.

The dates are just a week ahead, October 18 and 19, and all committees are in working order and doing things. M. S. Shrock, county agent, is here helping in every way possible and his knowledge of fairs will be of inestimable value to the Dairy and Hog Show. Miss Lorene Parker, county demonstration agent, is likewise in the field spending all her time in the interest of the women. She will bring an exhibit here from the state fair and will conduct a school team canning contest and otherwise interest the women. W. C. Green, county school superintendent, is interesting himself in school industrial exhibits and will add much interest to the show.

G. A. Cressy is now in the Willamette valley buying another carload of high grade Jersey cows which will again be sold at public auction the first day of the fair. A specialty will also be made of offering high grade hogs for sale either by private sale or by auction and this feature is being advertised throughout the county. Any good hog may be offered and other cattle may also be offered for sale and the sales feature is expected to become an important part of our annual show.

The tent and grounds committee, consisting of F. M. Gulwitz chairman, J. W. Campbell, C. C. Mason, W. N. Rees and A. W. Agnew have completed arrangements and will prepare better show grounds than the show has ever had. The general committee consisting of H. J. Stillings, G. A. Cressy, J. J. Casserly, C. M. Jackson, F. C. McKenzie, J. H. Young and Henry S. Merner have matters well in hand after a series of meetings and the premium list printed elsewhere in these columns is ready for distribution. A supplementary premium list may also be added and all who have exhibits should inform themselves as to premiums and requirements.

Interest outside of the Hermiston country is greater than ever before and the attendance from over the county is expected to be large.
