

WRITES ABOUT DAILY GRIND IN FRANCE

Robert Hobbs, who is in the Motor Division Service with the First American Army in France, writes the following letter to his parents:

Headquarters C. A. S., 1st Army
A. P. O. 774

Drew four more letters today from the M. D. S. rider besides several which I received the other day. Well, what do you think of the war news these days? Isn't it splendid the way our boys are working and slowly pushing the Huns to the finish?

Another general order out now cutting our speed limit down to thirty miles per, so find my work quite a pleasure at that rate instead of a duty. It has been pretty quiet today so far. I have been out only once, covering about 18 miles; usually make about fifty or a hundred miles a day if not more, but my machine has been pretty dirty the last couple of days so spent my time in cleaning up.

I hunted all around town last night for a place to take a bath and finally resorted to the river—rather cold but refreshing. Was over to the commissary shortly after dinner and tried to buy a little canned fruit to eat occasionally. Was down to the "Y" yesterday for dinner and got a dandy feed; a choice of circus lemonade, (fruit) chocolate or coffee and lettuce salad, a cold sausage roll, canned corn, chocolate tapioca pudding and also white bread. We get white bread almost all together but occasionally like a little of the French bread as it has a very good flavor.

We had a little excitement a few evenings ago but very little damage was done with few casualties. Yes, the Huns still fly over us once in a while and the roses they drop are not very pleasing, but its ["Cela gave"], but I suppose we will have to stand it until our final drive. Love to all,
