Announced His Candidacy

To the readers of The Hermiston Herald:

Hon. A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, Oregon, has announced himself a candidate for Justice of the Supreme Court to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Frank A. Moore. There are four candidates for this office to fill said vacancy. No one of their names appears upon the ballot. The name, therefore, of the candidate who is the choice of the voters will necessarily have to be written upon the ballot. Near the top of the right hand column of the ballot will be found the place for the name to be written.

Judge Bennett is a democrat; the other three candidates are republicans. Mr. Bennett is known to the bench and bar of Oregon, Washington and Idaho as one of the ablest lawyers in the Northwest.

The Supreme court of Oregon consists of seven members. As it is now constituted each member is a republican. There should be one or more democrats upon the bench. Mr. Bennett would be an ornament to the Bench on account of his splendid legal ability, as well as his fine reputation for honesty, morality and good citizenship generally.

In order to vote for him correctly so that there will be no mistake about the vote being counted, his name should be written A. S. BENNETT and a cross mark (X) placed in front of the name.

We sincerely trust that the voters will carefully consider this matter and realize the importance of electing Judge Bennett.
