Strength of the Condor.

The enormous strength of the condor is equaled by his voracity and boldness. This immense bird often pounces upon small animals, but from the shape and bluntness of his claws it is unable to carry anything very heavy, so he contents himself with fixing it against the ground with one of his claws, while with the other and his powerful beak he rends it to pieces. Gorged with food, the bird then becomes incapable of flight and may be approached, but any attempt at capture is furiously resisted. An American traveler in the Andes encountered a large condor just after it had finished a hearty banquet on a young sheep and foolishly attempted to seize the bird, with the result that he received a gash from its claw. Then he called up his two guides, and the three men maneuvered to take the bird alive. But every attempt was frustrated, and in the end one of the men killed it by a blow with a hatchet.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

HEAVY TAXATION BURDEN TO CONTINUE

A dispatch from Washington says: America will pay war taxes until 1925. Treasury plans show the heavy taxation burden must continue at least six years more. The end of the actual fighting cut the 1918 cost by \$6,000,000,000, McAdoo has announced, but immediate war expenses will continue.

Facing the treasury for the present fiscal year is an expenditure of \$8,000,000,000; for the fiscal year ending in June 1920, \$5,000,000,000 and for the next four years government expenditures will range around \$3,500,000,000. After January 1925 expenses should not exceed \$2,000,000,000 officials estimate. During the next year the United States will be liquidating obligations incident to the war, meeting, in addition, expenses of interest on loans and expanded government. After then, expenditures will consist of bond interest payment and steadily increasing expense resulting from war risk insurance payments and many governmental activities caused by the reconstruction programme.
